Potter recounts school's growth

Appropriately, as the school prepares to celebrate its 70th anniversary in 1990, an historical account of its development is scheduled for publication this summer. *A Portrait of Success*, written by **Dean Emeritus Ruby Potter**, reviews the struggles and exemplary leadership of the school and its early directors; namely, Nancy Taylor 1920-26; Pearl Flowers, 1926-35; Helen Nahm, 1935-42; and Potter 1941-46.

Our roots began with the Parker Memorial Hospital Training School for Nurses. Between 1901 and 1920, twenty-five students earned training school certificates and 19 students earned graduate nurse designations. The official founding date of the University School of Nursing is 1920. Through a combined program of nursing and arts and science courses, 103 students earned graduate nurse designations and 85 students earned three-year baccalaureate degrees. During the next 32 years, 188 students graduated, representing 6 percent of the total graduates.

The Board of Curators in 1950 approved a four-year bachelor's in nursing program. Our first students graduated from this program in 1954. The master's degree program was initiated in 1968. The first year students graduated with MS degrees was 1970. Through 1973, 872 students had received bachelor's degrees and 25 had received master's degrees.

For 53 years (1920-73), the school was affiliated with the School of Medicine. During this time 36 percent of our total graduates, 1,085, completed their degrees. In 1973, the school became an autonomous division. From September 1973 to May 1989, 1,910 students graduated for 64 percent of the total. This figure represents 1,613 receiving bachelor's degrees and 297 obtaining master's degrees. The total number of degrees awarded from September 1920 to May 1989 is 2,995 (2,884 received one degree and 111 received two degrees).

Dean Potter's book will be available for sale before September, when we celebrate our 70th birthday and the grand alumni reunion. Our alumni are the legacy to the future of the school and to academic nursing. Almost two-thirds of our students have graduated in the past 16 years, giving us a young alumni group. Since 1923, 41 alumni have died. The school is looking ahead to the year 2020, when nearly 3,000 additional alumni will join us in celebrating the School of Nursing's centennial anniversary.

Students Present Symposium on Community Health Problems



Fritz juggles multifaceted career



After three years as a health systems development consultant in Aman, Jordan, **Wanona S. Fritz,** BSN '68, has returned to St. Louis. For the National Medical Institution, a corporation of 28 hospitals in Jordan, Fritz designed and conducted assessments of the hospitals; conducted strategic and financial planning as well as renovation and construction projects; spearheaded all quality-assurance work; improved personnel policies; wrote

proposed national legislation, and served as a consultant to King Hussein. Her bachelor's degree and graduate work, she says, prepared her for this mixed role. Studies in Arabic language, and Mideast history and politics also contributed to her success and to her receiving a Medal of Honor from Hussein.

Fritz' national reputation in the fields of academics, business and the military proved to be an asset, too. For more than 15 years, she has been a consultant to health systems, colleges, manufacturers, and the federal government. In St. Louis she was president of Wellness Systems Inc. The firm worked with companies in improving their employees' production while enhancing the quality of work life.

She was an assistant professor at the University of Maryland, where she taught graduate administration and education courses. In the U.S. Army, she earned her pilot's wings and served in health-care nursing and management roles in the United States and in Vietnam, where she received a Bronze Star.

Fritz devotes much of her current practice and writing to personnel and management development, health facilities construction and upgrade; organization assessment and analysis. One of her projects was renovating a hospital into a college of nursing—from the space design phase through construction and opening.

In August, she will receive a doctorate in Education from the University of Maryland-Baltimore.

Nursing shortage makes recruiting tough

...Service League Auxiliary provides scholarships

The Service League Auxiliary of the University Hospital and Clinics has donated \$30,000 in endowment funds to be used for MU nursing student scholarships.

The endowment fund represents the largest one-time contribution the group has made. Also known as the "Pink Ladies," the Service League has been providing nursing scholarships for more than 10 years.

The Service League, which has awarded about 20 scholarships to nursing students since 1977, raises money for scholarships through the sales at Medtique Gifts, a gift and flower shop in the hospital. "Everyone involved in the Service League is so pleased to be able to participate in such a worthwhile program, and we would like to thank the University for the opportunity," said Dorothy Chappell, president-elect of the league, during the presentation of the endowment.

In addition to providing scholarships for nursing students, Service League members also volunteer to work in many capacities within the hospital. Chappell and Opal Bergman, chairwoman of the league's scholarship committee, volunteer their time each week to work at the hospital's information desk, helping patients, families and hospital personnel.

Alicia Wilson, also a Service League member, is the director of Medtique, the league's top fund-raising operation. Faith Loupzenhiser, league president, and Mary Margaret Harrison, league treasurer, also have been involved in developing the scholarship.

"On behalf of the faculty, alumni and students, we're very proud to have these ladies not only providing needed scholarships for our nursing students, but also contributing their valuable time to work in the hospital," Drennan says. "The hospital could not run as effectively as it does without the help of these fine persons."

The research of **Lawrence Ganong** and Marilyn Coleman indicates that a father's sex role is affected by his children's genders. The researchers found that fathers who have sons show significantly fewer of the traits that generally are characterized as female. But Ganong and Coleman caution that fathers are not necessarily less masculine because they do not have sons. The study found that mothers with sons displayed even more feminine traits.
