On Sept. 29, the School of Nursing celebrated the 70th anniversary of its official founding in 1920. Although established in 1904, it was in 1920 that the School became part of the University of Missouri.

Events included a mock malpractice trial, a tour of the Health Sciences Center coordinated and conducted by **Cindy Brooks**, BSN '77; a student-sponsored 70th Anniversary Party and balloon release; and the Sesquicentennial Seminar address "A Future Vision of Nursing" by Dean Toni Sullivan. the Holiday Inn Executive Center were 230 alumni, students, faculty, staff and friends. Dear Alumni,

It is a pleasure to say hello to all of you. I am delighted to have the opportunity to serve as dean of the MU School of Nursing. Ours is a good school. I believe the School is well-positioned to move into the 21st century. I think this School is on the verge of becoming an eminent school, and I want to be a part of that.

I must confess that living and working in Columbia, Mo. offers a different life style for my husband, Jim, and me. We had lived and worked most of our lives in New Jersey in the metropolitan area of New York. We spent the past seven years in Southern California in the Los Angeles area. So this was a big move, and we were nervous. We are finding, however, that the community and the state offer many nice advantages, and we don't miss the traffic a bit. We do miss our children, but they are grown and settled in California. It was a unique experience having the parents go off and leave the children.

Let me share a little about my professional background. I've been a nurse for more than 30 years. My nursing practice experience spans 15 or more years as does my involvement in nursing education. My master's and doctorate are in nursing education from Teachers College, Columbia University. My clinical nurse specialty area is community health nursing with a focus on nursing the elderly. Most of my attention over the past 10 to 12 years has been directed toward developing and implementing programs in nursing education that are traditionally sound and forward-looking. I've had the privilege of being in a leadership position in such efforts at Seton Hall University and Felician College in New Jersey, and at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. Being involved in establishing the PhD in Nursing here at Mizzou offers a new and exciting challenge for me.

Over the years, I have developed many convictions about nursing which I'd like to share with you. First, I believe nursing care has the potential to notably improve the health and welfare of people of all ages with varied health care needs and problems. In order for nursing to fulfill its potential and its societal obligations, nurses must be well-educated, intellectually progressive professionals who are willing and able to engage in complex clinical decision making. Second, I believe nursing offers a splendid career choice for young men and women. Nursing education is a fabulous foundation for an intellectually and socially satisfying career. Our obligation is two-fold: to present an accurate, positive image of nursing and to provide leadership in modernizing and patterning attractive nursing practice environments. Third, I believe nursing in the academic health center must be on the cutting edge of presenting nursing as a research-based practice field. Faculty and students, therefore, must be steeped in theory and practice, and in integrating the two. Patient care is a necessary part of the nursing education programs at undergraduate and graduate levels. Fourth, nursing, like other health-care fields, is faced with a knowledge explosion and an explosive growth of technology. Fundamental values of nursing have not changed, however. The caring that occurs for the whole person and the family is more important than ever.

Thanks in large part to the contribution of the Mizzou School of Nursing, I find that the state of nursing in Missouri is noticeably excellent. Still, I am learning of the great needs for health care that Missourians have. Statewide, citizens of all ages can benefit from high-quality nursing care delivery and research. My overall goal is for the School to provide leadership in nursing education, practice and research for the purpose of improving the health and well-being of the citizens of Missouri and the nation.

Finally, I would ask for the continued assistance and support of the Mizzou nursing alumni. You are a wonderful group. Your support and participation in the 70th anniversary celebration, the establishment of the Potter-Brinton Distinguished Professorship, and the annual campaign are impressive and much appreciated. Your support and participation also are necessary if we are to achieve the lofty goals we share for our School. I feel a sense of urgency and ask you to join me in that feeling. The citizens of our state need us to be excellent for their sakes. We can do no less.

Please keep in touch. You are always welcome to come visit your School. I look forward to meeting each and every one of you personally.

Lynn Parshall picked patient educator of the year

Lynn Parshall, BSN 81, staff nurse IV, Cognitive Disabilities, was chosen Patient Educator of the Year at University Hospital and Clinics during ceremonies Nov. 8, 1989.

In nominating Lynn, her co-workers explained that she exemplifies the criteria for a patient educator. She has "unequaled creativity, sincerity and knowledge," says Richard Tollerton, clinical supervisor, Rusk 5. "She shows concern for individuals in a nonjudgmental, caring way."

Lynne Williams, staff nurse III, Rusk 4, adds, "She provides a calm, relaxed atmosphere and always takes whatever time is needed to make the patient and family feel comfortable with all the information provided."

Bruce Neff, social worker, Rusk 5, says, "1 work with Lynn on the Brain Injury Education Program Committee at Rusk. She is innovative with her ideas about family education. She has a positive attitude toward her work. She has a variety of teaching techniques which help give people a better understanding of the topic she presents. She is always aware of complicated family situations and schedules team meetings to address the problem."

Kathy Moberly, staff nurse 111, Rusk 5, explains that Lynn supports patients and their families by "teaching without overloading them for the change from ICU to the floor situation. This is a nurturing art blending nursing expertise and esteem for patients as people and not a learned book procedure."

Dr. William M. Platt, resident physician, agrees that Lynn shows superior patient education qualities. "Add to that her willingness to work the extra hours to effectively communicate the multidimensional information related to head injury patients and their families and you have exceptional commitment," he says.

Rhodes also served as moderator for a concurrent session on health-care delivery systems for a pediatric population, which included presentations from South Africa, Taiwan, and the United States.

the American Academy of Nursing at the 1989 annual meeting and scientific session Oct. 15-18 in Denver. Throughout her career, Sullivan has endeavored to advance nursing scholarship and nursing's ability to contribute to health care.
