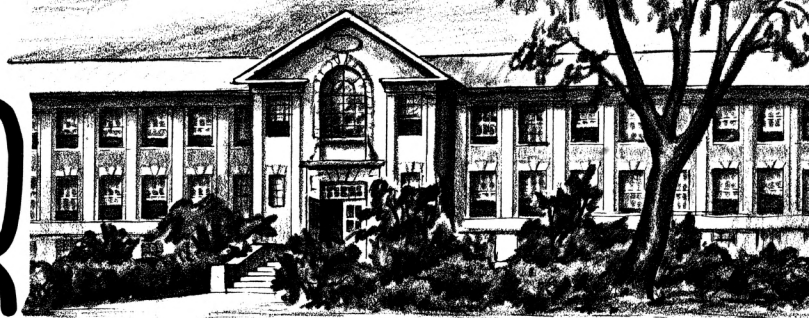

The Uesta plans were set up by Mrs. Garrett and approved, with a few changes, by the Council. The nominating committee of the Council appointed members for the various Uesta committees, also.

The Council has spent some time working on the two amendments to the constitution which were presented in an assembly. The first amendment permits the Student Council to start work as soon as school opens instead of the usual delay while the president and members of the Council are elected. The second merely changes the standing committees - Activities, Assembly, Publicity and Intra-mural - to commissions which have the power to act without direct permission from the Council. This results in a great saving of time.

Among the recommendations of things to be accomplished this year left by the previous Student Council was a suggestion that a noon-hour program be arranged. This has already been worked out up to Christmas vacation. In addition to the weekly movie a basketball and a volley ball tournament have been started. Any good ideas for noon-hour activities would be gladly welcomed by the Council.

As yet, nothing definite has been done towards obtaining an electric scoreboard, but the Council expresses its sincere desire that some day it will be able to buy one for the school.

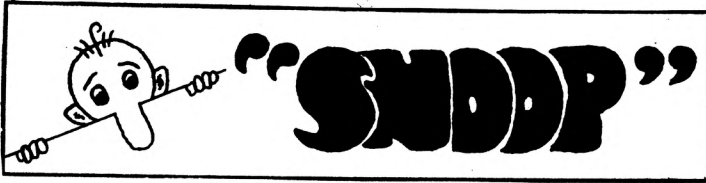
Regular softball rules were played with several exceptions, and the student teachers helped Mrs. Lanser officiate.

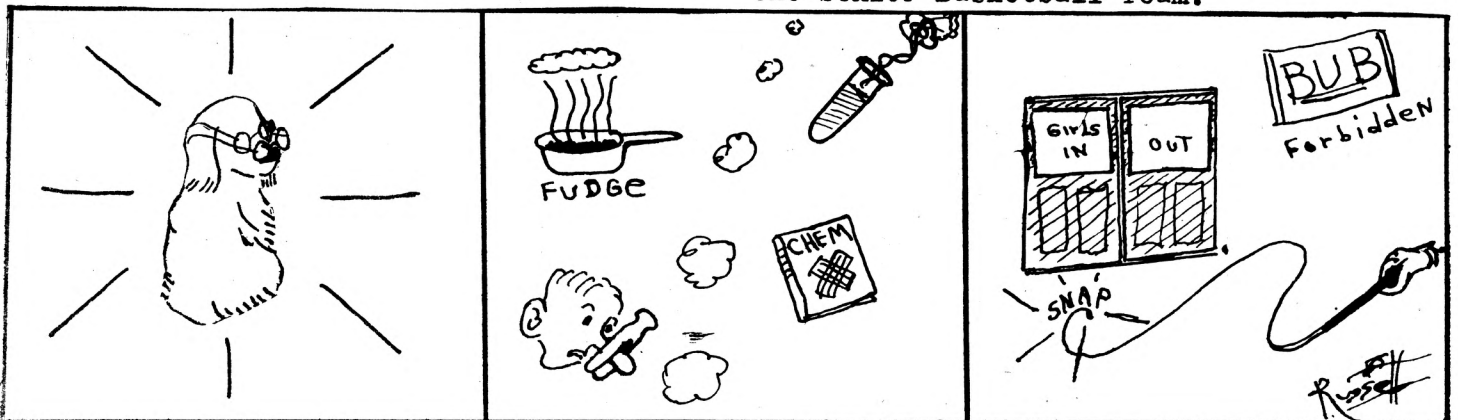
Is Marilyn Loomis getting taller, or was she sitting on someone's lap? Don Nagler oughta know. He had the hot seat!
