
Coming to school with Skip Johnston in his new purple jetplane, we see Julia Deimund and Liz Bueker playing catch with a small star on a neighboring cloud.

We also find that the one and only Enice Hubble has taken Coach Forshee's place. Mr. Forshee is now coaching a star ball team on Mercury.





With the basketball season reaching climactic proportions, the Cubs rose to the occasion by downing Jamestown 71 to 53 in the final scheduled game of the season for the black and gold. The victory was sweet one for the Cub hoopsters, for James--town beat the U. High team in a game in the early part of the season. The Junior High team has played very good ball this year considering the lack of experienced players at the start of the season. They finished up with a 6 won, 2 lost record for 50-'51.




