An article appeared in the Sunday Missourian which cannot go without comment. The article dealt with the counseling services at U-High. While some of the mistakes of the article can be attributed to typical Missourian reporting, its gross inaccuracies cannot be ignored.

The article first mentions the high quality of U-High counselors, first of all because they are under 30, and secondly because they are candidates for masters degrees. This is the first time that I have seen youth and inexperience equated with excellence. In the times that I have been in room 222 the counselors were totally incapable of answering such simple questions as "When should I take SAT's?" "How often?" "What about Advanced Placement?" In the four (no more) times that I have had a conference with my "counselor" they have not only been unable to answer many of my questions but have given me incorrect information. Next the article lauded the counseling aids of the department. The primary source of information, the college catalogues, is old and incomplete. I was not even aware of the other aids, but then that's not surprising considering that I've only been in the office 4 times. Finally the article stated that U-High administers SAT's and ACT's. Hickman is the only authorized testing center for these tests in Columbia. These are but a few of the most noteworthy mistakes of the article.

For most students the article must have provided a little Sunday morning entertainment (it is ironic that it appeared on the reverse side of the comics). What is sad is that parents and people outside the school will read the article and think it is true. They will believe that U-High counseling is adequate, even good and isn't that the worst part of it all?
