

During 1980-81 there were 14,350 new enrollments in Center for Independent Study courses. 

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Information and Regulations



INFORMATION AND REGULATIONS

Accreditation

The University of Missouri is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and many other accrediting agencies.

Admission

You may enroll at any time. To be eligible to enroll in an Independent Study course for university credit, you must have a high school diploma or equivalent. To be eligible to enroll in a high school Independent Study course, you must either have completed the eighth grade or be at least eighteen years old.

Courses (General Information)

University Courses

All university courses offered by correspondence instruction are developed by University faculty members at one of the four campuses of the University of Missouri. They have been approved by appropriate chairpersons and are equivalent to courses taught on campus. Each listing contains the course number, title, and initials of the campus offering the course.

Multicampus Courses

In some cases a single course offered by the Center for Independent Study may have several course numbers. This means that two or more campuses of the University of Missouri have cooperated in developing the course. Each campus has its own title and number for the course, but the subject matter is the same.

Special Readings/Problems Courses

Some academic departments at UMC offer Special Readings and Problems courses through the Center. If you attend UMC, you should come to our office and get an approval form to be completed and signed by your adviser. You should then make arrange-

ments with an appropriate faculty member to design and supervise your course.

If you are *not* a UMC student, send your application form with the fee for the number of hours for which you are applying. Also, on a separate sheet, write a concise statement 1) explaining why you wish to take this course, 2) describing your particular objective, area of interest, or other information that will assist the person designing the course, and 3) listing the courses you have taken or experience you have had in the area of your interest. If we aren't successful in finding a University of Missouri faculty member to design a course for you, we will return your payment.

University Courses For High School Seniors

For information about university courses that can be taken for credit by qualified high school seniors, see pages 62-63.

High School Courses

The Center for Independent Study offers an extensive high school curriculum. Each course is developed under the supervision of a teacher certified by the state of Missouri. The amount of study required and the credit given are equivalent to that of similar courses offered in accredited public schools.

The Center for Independent Study does not award high school diplomas. If you wish to apply Independent Study credit toward a high school diploma, you must first obtain your high school principal's or counselor's signature on the course application form.

Independent Study Courses From Other Universities

The Center for Independent Study through Correspondence is a member of the National University Continuing Education Association, which publishes a *Guide to Independent Study*. This publication lists courses offered by accredited colleges and universities that are members of the Association.

If a course in which you have an interest is not listed in this catalog, you can find a copy of the *Guide* in each University of Missouri Extension Center, or you can purchase one for \$4.50 from the National University Continuing Education Association, Book Order Department, Box 978, Edison, New Jersey 08817.

University of Mid-America

The University of Missouri is a member of a consortium of eleven mid-western universities that administers a non-traditional study program called the University of Mid-America.

Through the use of television, radio, videocassettes, audiocassettes, textbooks, study guides and other printed materials, UMA in Missouri provides individuals with an alternative to campus based college courses.

All courses offer credit, but their suitability to a particular degree program is subject to the regulations of the institution and department offering the degree. It is urged that students pursuing a degree ascertain from their academic advisers the applicability of a course to the degree sought before enrolling in a UMA course. Grade reports will be issued and credit awarded by the University of Missouri as regular resident credit and is transferable to other colleges and universities (subject to the regulations of these colleges and universities). If you do not need or want college credit, you may enroll in any course on a non-credit basis.

How the Program Works: Each course has been approved and is offered by an academic department at one or more of the four University of Missouri campuses: Columbia, Kansas City, Rolla or St. Louis.

Lessons for some of the courses are broadcast over television beginning each February and September. All courses are available for viewing on videocassettes at UMA Learning Centers across the state.

Mentors (instructors) are available one evening a week by phone (students call collect or on a toll-free number) to answer questions and discuss exams.

Students view the lessons, study the textbooks and talk with mentors. After completing the necessary work, exams are administered at UMA Learning Centers or other designated testing areas.

Enrolling in Independent Study Courses

Advisers

The Center's staff is not authorized to provide advisement services. It is your responsibility to determine whether or not a particular course will meet your requirements. Students enrolling in university courses may obtain further information from the academic dean's office of the school or college where the credit will be applied. Students enrolling in high school courses should talk with their counselor or principal.

Eligibility

University Courses: If you plan to use a course for credit toward a degree at the University of Missouri, you must obtain prior approval, indicated by the signature of an appropriate official of your college or school on the application form. Other universities may have similar requirements. You may enroll at any time of the year.

A high school diploma or equivalent is required before enrolling in a university course.

High School seniors may be eligible for a number of basic university courses; see UNIVERSITY COURSES FOR HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS.

High School Courses: If you have completed the eighth grade or are at least 18 years old, you may enroll in a high school Independent Study course. If you are working on a diploma, your principal or counselor must approve your course for credit by signing the back of your application.

Generally, you must have earned credit for the first half unit of a high school course, either in a high school or by correspondence, before you may enroll in the second half unit of that course.

Group Enrollment in High School Courses

A number of high schools make use of group enrollments in correspondence courses in order to provide their students with the opportunity to enroll in courses that the schools would not otherwise be able to offer. The students in the group meet for regularly scheduled sessions under the supervision of a faculty member. The course materials are provided by the Center for Independent Study and the completed assignments are returned to the Center for evaluation and grading.

This program offers a combination of classroom interaction, provided by the local school, and subject matter expertise, provided by the Center.

Enrollment Procedure

You may apply for enrollment in an Independent Study course at any time by submit-

ting an application form (at the back of this catalog) along with the appropriate course fees. Ordinarily, we mail materials the day after we receive your application. If you do not receive the materials within a reasonable length of time (two or three weeks), you should contact the Center regarding your application. If you do not provide all the information requested on the application, or if you do not enclose payment, your application will be returned to you.

Course applications and book order forms are in the back of this catalog; you may obtain additional forms from us and from University Extension Centers located throughout the state of Missouri. Look in the back of this catalog for a listing of the University Extension Centers.

Use a separate application form for each course in which you enroll. Generally, we recommend that you not enroll in more than two Independent Study courses at one time.

Enrollment in a correspondence course does not constitute admission to the University of Missouri.

The Center for Independent Study through Correspondence reserves the right to change instructors, discontinue courses, change policies, or adjust fees listed in this catalog as circumstances warrant.

Social Security Administration Number (SSAN)

Our records are maintained on computer. Your SSAN will be used to identify your student records and to keep track of your progress in each course. Therefore it is essential that you carefully and legibly write your SSAN in the space provided on the application, as well as on all lessons or other correspondence you submit to the Center. (If you don't provide us with an SSAN, we will assign a nine-digit number you must use in its place.)

Veterans

Under "Veterans Administration" in most telephone directories, a local number is listed that you can call to get answers to questions concerning eligibility and instructions regarding enrolling in Independent Study courses. All of the university, not high school, courses listed in this catalog are approved for veterans or other persons eligible under the provisions of the GI Bill.

The course fee must accompany your application. The VA will reimburse you after they receive the Certification of Enrollment from us.

The VA will allow veterans who are enrolled on campus to add a maximum of five credit hours of independent study to "on campus" hours to determine educational benefit payments. Independent study course work must be completed by the end of the semester concerned.

We will send you additional information and forms to complete if you mark the appropriate item on the application form.

Foreign Students

The Center for Independent Study does not award diplomas or degrees. Your enrollment in a correspondence course does not admit you to the University of Missouri or to a specific degree program.

English Language: All Independent Study courses are written in English. Therefore, a good command of the English language is essential for successfully completing any course.

Mail Service: Surface mail may take several weeks. If your address does not have a U.S. Zip Code designation, you must order and pay for Air Mail delivery of course materials, texts, and lesson service. Mark the appropriate space on line 3 on the back of the application form. Exceptions to this rule are Canada and Mexico.

Payment: Payment for all fees and texts must be made in U.S. dollars and accompany your application. We cannot accept foreign checks.

Course Materials: Persons with addresses without U.S. Zip Code designations may not enroll in courses that require materials such as filmstrips, records, or cassettes. Check the course descriptions for these.

Transfer of Credit: Before enrolling, you are responsible for determining whether or

not the credit for a specific correspondence course will meet your particular educational objectives. The Center is not authorized to advise on a course of study.

Transfer to Different Courses

You may transfer from one credit course to another credit course only once. A fee of \$10.00 is charged to cover the cost of the transfer. In addition, you will be charged \$2.00 (university courses) or \$1.50 (high school courses) for each lesson and/or examination submitted, if any, in the original course. If the new course carries more credit than the original course, we will charge you the regular fee for the additional credit. If the new course carries less credit, we will give you a refund, if any, according to the refund policy on page 11. You must transfer within nine months of your original enrollment. Your enrollment for the new course will expire on the expiration date of the original course. You may not transfer your enrollment to another student.

Repeating Courses

Anyone who fails to make a passing grade in an Independent Study course may repeat the course by reenrolling and paying full fees. Anyone who fails to make a passing grade in the repeat course will not be permitted to enroll a third time in the same course.

Fees

Course fees for out-of-state students are the same as for Missouri residents. Fees are included in the course descriptions.

Course fees are:

\$36.25 per undergraduate semester credit hour.

\$40.00 per graduate semester credit hour.

\$34.00 for each ½ unit of high school credit.

If you do not have a U.S. Zip Code address, you must pay an Air Mail fee in addition to the standard fee, unless your address is in Canada or Mexico, in which case the Air Mail fee is optional. The Air Mail fee provides Air Mail service for the study guide, return lesson service and regular correspondence we send to you.

Make your check or money order payable to the UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI and mail it along with the application form to the Center. Fees, including texts and supplies, may also be paid by VISA® or MasterCard®; see the application form.

The Center reserves the right to revise or discontinue courses and to adjust the fees listed in this catalog as circumstances warrant. If a course for which you have remitted fees is discontinued, your payment will be returned.

Financial Aid

No scholarships or other forms of financial aid are available through the Center for Independent Study. For information on financial assistance for veterans, please see pages 9-10.

Some business firms and organizations encourage employees to continue their education by paying part or all of their tuition and fees. Since there is considerable variation in this practice, it may be worthwhile for you to check with your employer.

In some instances, high schools pay tuition and fees for students within their school district who are of regular school age. Please check with local school administrators to ascertain the policy in your district.

Refunds

Requests to withdraw from a course must be made in writing. (A postcard form is provided in the back of the study guide). The postmark will be used as the withdrawal date. We make refunds according to the following terms:

Request postmarked within first month after enrolling 70% refund Request postmarked within second month after enrolling 50% refund After second month of enrolling no refund

No refund can be made after a student has submitted all of the lessons.

Your refund will be mailed about two weeks after we receive your request. However, if you paid by check, your refund cannot be processed until six weeks after your enrollment date.

The amount of your refund will be reduced by \$2.00 (university course) or \$1.50 (high school course) for each lesson and examination you submitted for evaluation before withdrawing.

We do not refund amounts less than \$1.00.

Time Limits

The enrollment period for each course is nine months, but one three-month extension will be granted upon your request, along with payment of a \$5.00 extension fee. If you do not complete a course by the date of expiration, your enrollment will be cancelled and no record will be entered on your transcript.

Although the amount of time you will actually require to complete a course will depend upon your individual circumstances, the average university course completion time is about six months. Average high school completion time is about four months. Only under extraordinary circumstances could a student complete an Independent Study course in less than six weeks; therefore you should not enroll with this expectation. Most courses require you to take a midterm and a final exam. All preceding lesson assignments must be submitted before you may take an exam and there must be a minimum of one week between exams.

To derive maximum educational benefit from a course, you should wait for the return of each lesson before submitting the next. The lessons are either processed by computer, which will take about three days, or by an instructor, which will take from three to ten days. Because the Center is open throughout the year except for national holidays, you can expect to receive your computer-processed lesson reports without interruption; instructor-evaluated lessons, however, may be returned more slowly during those times of year when University classes are not in session.

If you plan to use Independent Study toward graduation or certification requirements, plan ahead so that you will complete all work, including examinations, at least three weeks before you must have the report of credit.

Study Materials

Study Guide

Everyone who enrolls for Independent Study will receive a study guide containing lessons and all the forms and instructions necessary to complete the course.

If you need a replacement study guide, send your request, naming the course, and a check for \$5.00 payable to the University of Missouri.

Textbooks

The textbooks and any other required materials are listed with each course description in this catalog and are available from the Center. If you plan to purchase your textbooks from the Center, you should order them at the time you enroll, since at a later date the texts may be unavailable. Courses are revised throughout the year; therefore, if you do not purchase your texts from the Center, you should wait for the study guide to check the exact titles and copyright dates. In accordance with University policy, we can sell our textbooks only to persons enrolled in Independent Study courses.

Ordering Textbooks: To order texts, carefully and completely fill in the Textbook Order Form located in the back of this catalog. Total the costs and enter this amount on the course application. If you prefer used texts, mark the appropriate square on the Textbook Order Form. If we have the used texts you want, we will send them to you and refund the price difference. Send the Textbook Order Form, the enrollment application, and payment for the total amount to the Center. If you use VISA® or MasterCard®, simply supply the requested information on the Textbook Order Form.

Price Changes: The prices listed for the textbooks were correct when this catalog was printed but may change without notice.

Missouri Tax: Persons ordering books sent to Missouri addresses must add sales tax to the cost of texts and supplies. (See the application form.)

Textbook Changes: If a course has been revised since the publishing of this catalog,

there will probably be a change in texts. We will send the revised course and applicable texts. If there is an increase in costs, we will send a bill for the difference. If the difference exceeds \$10.00, we will return your application and check, indicating the exact cost. We will make refunds for overpayment in excess of \$1.00

Repurchase of Textbooks: Under certain conditions, the Center will repurchase your texts when you no longer need them. A Repurchase of Independent Study Texts form, listing the conditions of repurchase, will be mailed along with your textbooks. Do not mail your old texts until you have received permission to return them. Repurchase price is one-half the price you originally paid for texts. We may be able to repurchase workbooks if they have not been marked in and have all pages intact. We cannot repurchase any course study guide.

Supplementary Materials

Some courses require supplementary reference books and equipment, which are available from the Center. These require a rental fee and refundable deposit. Look in the course descriptions in this catalog for specific information about rental and deposit fees. Audio-visual materials such as records, cassette tapes, or filmstrips are either rented or purchased; the course description will indicate which is the case.

Do not send rental and deposit payment with your application unless directed to do so in the course description. Check your course study guide for information on how to obtain rental materials and equipment.

Note: Most courses that require supplementary materials are not available to persons with addresses without U.S. Zip Code designations. These courses will be identified with a mark (+) in the course listing.

Return of Rented Materials: All materials rented from the Center must be returned before we will report your course grade and credit to the Director of Admissions. It is your responsibility to see that the materials are returned in good condition.

Mailing of Study Materials

Continental U.S.: Your parcel will be mailed by Library Rate if your address has a U.S. Zip Code designation. Delivery of Library Rate mail can take up to 3 weeks. If you want your parcel processed by the post office right after First Class mail, you should mark the appropriate space on the back of your application form and include an additional \$1.00 for Special Handling.

Military: You may add \$1.00 for PAL or SAM. Note that you want this service on the back of your application form under the enrollment fee.

Libraries

More than thirty-five public and private colleges and universities throughout Missouri have generously agreed to permit students in university Independent Study courses to use their library facilities and to borrow their books. Each Missouri resident enrolled in a university correspondence course will receive a list of these, along with regulations and a library card.

Examinations

Almost all Independent Study courses taken for credit require supervised examinations. Since these are the only supervised activities required for Independent Study courses, examination grades are major factors in determining course grades. Academic dishonesty will be dealt with according to University policy.

Before you will be given an examination, we must have received all required lessons. Your course study guide contains more detailed information regarding examinations.

Examinations must be scheduled according to the following regulations:

University (Missouri Residents): You will be required to take all examinations in university-level Independent Study courses under the direct supervision of a staff member of a University of Missouri Extension Center, the Extension Centers at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, University of Missouri-Rolla, University of Missouri-St. Louis, or the Center for Independent

dent Study at Columbia (Refer to the list on pages 70-71 in this catalog). The Center for Independent Study at Columbia is open 8-5, Monday through Friday.

University (Non-Missouri Residents): You must make arrangements to take your examinations under the supervision of a superintendent or high school principal in a fully approved high school district, or a faculty member of an accredited university or college. The supervisor must not be related to you. The Center can provide no compensation to the person supervising an examination.

High School: You may take examinations under the supervision of a high school principal, counselor, or superintendent of schools, or at the above locations.

Military: You may follow the above procedures or take examinations under the supervision of your commanding officer or an officer appointed by your commanding officer.

Credit

Credit Value

The University of Missouri operates on the semester-hour system. The credit value in semester hours is indicated in parentheses after the course number and title in the course listings. The table below shows the relative values of semester and quarter hours

Credit Applicability

You are responsible for determining whether or not the credit for a specific correspondence course will apply toward your diploma, degree, certification, or other specific education goal.

Credit and Degrees

UM Undergraduate Students: You cannot earn a degree from the University of Missouri entirely through Independent Study. With the approval of your adviser, you may earn at least thirty semester hours of credit through Independent Study that will be applicable toward the bachelor's degree.

"At least thirty semester hours of credit, when earned in Independent Study courses or Extension courses taken from the University of Missouri, shall be counted toward meeting requirements of the undergraduate degrees offered by the various divisions of the University; provided further that the credit earned be in courses appropriate, either as specific requirements or as electives, to the degree pursued; provided that such credit once accepted by subject to the same regulations as are resident credits transferred between campuses of the University; and further provided that such credit shall not serve to reduce the resident credit required for degree programs due to regulations of professional accrediting agencies or associations." (Adopted by the Board of Curators of the University of Missouri, April 22. 1965.)

You will find specific information concerning courses and residency requirements in the bulletins issued by each college/division offering degrees. Write to the Director of Admissions, 130 Jesse Hall, Columbia, MO 65211.

UM Graduate Students: If you plan to use credit earned through Independent Study toward an advanced degree at one of the campuses of the University of Missouri, you should contact the Dean of the Graduate School on that campus.

Other Graduate Students: The UMC transcript will explain the course numbering system, making it possible for officials of other institutions of higher education to determine, in most cases, whether or not the student taking a particular course can be granted graduate credit.

Continuing Education Units (CEU)

For information about Continuing Education Units, see the NON-CREDIT section, beginning on page 65.

Transfer of Credit

You may transfer credit for courses taken through Independent Study to most educational institutions in the United States. If you question whether or not a particular course will apply, check with the institution where you plan to apply the credit.

Special Uses of Credit

Certification: The Center offers many university courses that may be used to meet various certification requirements. If you want to know whether or not a certain course may be used to meet the certification requirements of a particular state, you should check with the appropriate certifying agency. For teachers the address of the Missouri Department of Education Certification Division is: 100 East Capital, Jefferson City, MO 65101.

Grades

The "A, B, C, D, F" system of grading is used.

The grade "F" carries no credit; the grade "D" carries no credit in the Graduate School. If a course is not completed, no record of the course is made on your transcript.

Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory: Undergraduates may take correspondence courses on a satisfactory/unsatisfactory basis, according to campus policy. Only in a few instances may graduate students take correspondence courses on this basis. Check with your academic adviser if you have questions. Indicate on the application form if you want this designation instead of a letter grade.

Hearer

You may enroll as a "Hearer," in which case you must submit the lesson assignments for the course, but you do not take the examinations. When you complete the course, we add a record of it to your transcript, but without credit. There is no reduction of fees for enrolling as a "Hearer."

Transcripts

The Center will not release final grades or award credit until outstanding accounts, if any, are paid in full.

Since it may take as long as six weeks for personal checks to clear a bank, you may wish to pay your balance due by money order, certified check, VISA® or Master-Card®.

UM Students: After you complete an Independent Study course, the Registrar of UMC will automatically send a transcript to the Registrar of your University of Missouri campus if you indicated your campus and your student number on the Independent Study application form when you enrolled. If you are assigned a student number at UMKC, UMR, or UMSL after you have submitted your Independent Study application, you must send that number to the Center if you want a transcript sent to your campus.

Other University Students: All other university students receive transcript request cards along with their course grade notices. If you intend to use the transcript as proof of credit, you should send the request card to the Director of Admissions, indicating the college or university to which the transcript should be sent. There is no charge for a transcript.

High School Students: When you have completed a course and returned all rented reference material, if any, the Center will send you a notice of your final exam grade and your course grade. Within a few weeks, the Director of Admissions, University of Missouri, 130 Jesse Hall, Columbia, MO 65211, will send you a Record of Secondary Work. If neither of these two records is sufficient proof of completion, you may request a transcript from the Director of Admissions, or your counselor or principal may request a computer printout of your course completion record.

University Courses



UNIVERSITY COURSES

For general information regarding university courses see the appropriate portion of pages 7-15.

MC (Multicampus Course): The letters MC indicate a course that has been developed by faculty members and approved by departments from more than one campus of the University of Missouri. You should enroll under the course number and title for which you want to receive credit. English Composition on page 26 is an example of a multicampus course.

Prerequisites: If the prerequisite course is offered by the same department being described, we list its number only. For example, under 37 Accounting II the prerequisite is listed as 36. A prerequisite from a department other than the one being described will include the department's name: English 304, for example. This is true for UMC courses. Prerequisites for multicampus courses include the initials of the campus to which the prerequisite applies.

CALS (Computer Assisted Lesson Service): Whenever these letters appear with the description of a course, it means that you send your lesson assignments to the Center to be processed by computer. Submitted lesson assignments and examinations therefore require objective responses, which you mark on answer sheets included in the study guide. Instructional comments based on your answers will be returned to you in a computer print-out. Partly CALS means that some of the lessons are computer processed, and some are evaluated by an instructor.

Examination Time Limit: A maximum time limit for each course exam is listed with the number of exams for each course. Example: 7 lessons, 7 submitted. 2 exams—2 hours each.)

Course Fees: Some courses may be taken for either undergraduate or graduate credit. Please refer to Item 1 (Enrollment Fee Schedule) on the back of the application form (located at the back of this catalog).

Courses listed in this catalog may be discontinued and other courses may be added from time to time. The prices listed were correct when this catalog was printed; however, they are subject to change without notice.

Course Numbering System



The Center for Independent Study through Correspondence, University of Missouri, offers the following non-credit courses as part of a continuing effort to extend educational opportunities through correspondence instruction.

Enrollment

Anyone may apply for enrollment in an Independent Study non-credit course at any time by submitting an application form along with the appropriate course fee. Be sure to give all the information requested on the application form; otherwise your enrollment may be delayed.

Look for an application form attached in the back of this catalog. You may obtain additional forms from the Center for Independent Study or University Extension Centers located throughout the state of Missouri. Use a separate application form for each course in which you enroll.

Continuing Education Unit (CEU)

Anyone enrolled in a non-credit course can receive one CEU for the equivalent of each 10 contact hours of study. Each non-credit course is listed as a certain number of CEUs. If you want a CEU report, be sure to include your Social Security number (SSAN) on your application.

Course Fees

You will find the enrollment fee for each non-credit course listed in the course description. Send this fee along with your enrollment application. Out-of-state students pay the same enrollment fees as Missouri residents

Send a check or money order, made payable to the University of Missouri, along with the application form to the Center for Independent Study through Correspondence, University of Missouri, 400 Hitt Street, Columbia, MO 65211.

Textbooks

No textbooks are required for non-credit courses.

Examinations

Examinations are included as part of some non-credit courses. These are usually self-administered, open-book examinations.

Time Limits

The time limit to complete a non-credit course is nine (9) months, unless otherwise specified in the course description.

Handling Fee

There is no handling fee for non-credit courses

Air Mail

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Citizenship

Citizenship (2.5 CEU)

The United States Department of Justice Immigration and Naturalization Service has authorized the Center for Independent Study to offer this home study course to foreign-born persons desiring to become citizens of the United States of America. This nineteen lesson course provides the information candidates for citizenship will need to know when they appear before the Naturalization Examiner of the Department of Justice for the granting of citizenship. This course is not required, but it may be helpful. The enrollment fee includes lesson outlines, tests, and textbooks. Enrollment fee: \$30.00. Air Mail fee: \$7.00.

COMMUNITY AND COUNTY DEVELOPMENT

City and County Planning and Plan Implementation (1.3 CEU)

This ten lesson course was developed in an effort to make governmental officials, planning commissioners, and the public aware of the importance of comprehensive planning as a function of local government. The course covers such subjects as the legal foundation of planning, zoning and the subdividing of land, planning techniques, capital improvement programming, and plan implementation. Enrollment fee: \$10.00. Air Mail fee: \$5.50. Each person completing this course will receive a certificate signed by the Chancellor of the University of Missouri.

Home Economics

Those Important Preschool Years (1.3 CEU)

The important formative years of the preschool child is the subject of this course. Through this study, it is hoped that we will become more understanding, patient, loving, and by all means more involved with our children. This course is divided into six lessons. Enrollment fee: \$10.00. Air Mail fee: \$6.00.

Today's Homemaker (1.3 CEU)

A non-credit course which provides hints for better home management, home buying, the art of homemaking, and money (credit and budgets). This course is divided into five lessons. Enrollment fee: \$10.00. Air Mail fee: \$4.50.

Your Family's Food (1.3 CEU)

A non-credit course divided into five units: In the Market, In the Kitchen, In the Body, Through the Day, and For All Ages. This course has been written to help those persons who buy and prepare food to gain better knowledge and appreciation of food's place in the life and well-being of each family member. Enrollment fee: \$10.00. Air Mail fee: \$7.50.

Science in Food (1.3 CEU)

This course, which is divided into six lessons, explains how to safely preserve (can, dry, freeze) foods for future use. It also describes the principles of preparing enjoyable and nutritious meals. Enrollment fee: \$10.00. Air Mail fee: \$5.50.

Parks and Recreation

So You're a Park Board Member (1.3 CEU)

A practical guide for park board members. It describes in detail the authority, responsibilities, and functions of the park board. The course also contains helpful sections on finances and organization and an extensive listing of bulletins and pamphlets available to the park board member. This non-credit course is divided into six lessons. Enrollment fee: \$10.00. Air Mail fee: \$3.25.

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


