NEW OFFICE TO OVERSEE BUILDING RENOVATIONS, FUNDING

An Office of Facilities Management has been established by Chancellor Barbara S. Uehling in a preliminary step toward the development of an Office of Campus Physical Planning, according to Frank Quattrocchi, acting vice chancellor for administrative services.

The office began functioning Thursday, Nov. 15. Rex Dillow, assistant director of physical plant, was named interim director.

Quattrocchi said that UMC previously did not have a "master plan" for facility development, and that the campus facilities management office would develop such a plan and act as a central clearinghouse for funding and processing of requests for building alteration and repair.

The new Office of Facilities Management is located in the General Services Building. The office is being created using existing resources.

Acting Director Dillow will report to Quattrocchi, and will also work closely with the Director of Institutional Research and Planning, Duane Stucky.

Physical plant will continue to be administered by Business Operations Officer Emmett Klinkerman, and will continue to have responsibility for the operation and routine maintenance of facilities. The change in duties was made, Quattrocchi said, to separate the facilities management function from the day-to-day routine operations function.

Monthly reports on the status of repairs and renovations are planned from the Office of Facilities Management to those academic divisions and departments affected. The first report is scheduled before Dec. 1.

UMC BUDGET OFFICES RENAMED, FUNCTIONS REORGANIZED

In a move to improve the flow of budget documents and provide for timely payment of new employees, the campus budget operations function is being reorganized this week.

The change, according to acting vice chancellor Frank Quattrocchi, is the first phase of a two-phase campus plan involving budget operations. The reorganization is being made using existing funds and personnel. Budget activities performed by the current Budget Operations Office will be absorbed by the newly created UMC Budget Office, 319 Jesse Hall. Quattrocchi says the change was effective yesterday, Nov. 15; Becky Jones, previously manager of program budget development, is manager of the new office.

The reorganization, Quattrocchi says, assigns administrative responsibilities for UMC legislative and operating budget activities to one office and provides UMca and campus staff with a single contact point for budget-related data.

The current Budget Operations Office, located at 325 Jesse Hall, will be reorganized as the Central Processing Office-Employee Information, and will function as the campus clearinghouse for staff papers, including employee records. Jim Lay will continue as manager of that office.

One reason for the change in Lay's office, Quattrocchi says, is so the office can be set up to handle FISP, the UMca computerized payroll/personnel system which is planned for all UM campuses. The change will also eliminate duplication in personnel record keeping.

UMC COMMITTEE TO SEEK NEW BUSINESS SCHOOL DEAN

A committee to search for a new dean of the UMC College of Business and Public Administration has been appointed by Chancellor Uehling. Earlier this year S. Watson Dunn, the present dean, asked to be relieved of his administrative duties by next fall.

The nine-member committee is chaired by Roger P. Bey, associate professor of finance. Other faculty members on the committee include: Stanley Botner, director of graduate studies in public administration; Ben M. Enis, professor of marketing; James C. Stallman, associate professor of accountancy and James A. Wall Jr., associate professor of management.

Non-faculty members include: Jessica M. Bailey, a doctoral student in marketing; James H. Denman of Nevada, Mo., a 1941 graduate of UMC and Pat De Long, administrative associate in the College of Business and Public Administration.

William Kimel, dean of the College of Engineering, represents the Dean's Council on the committee.

Dean Dunn, who came to UMC in 1977, will remain on the UMC faculty as professor of marketing.

UNIVERSITY REACHES 20% OF UW GOAL

University system's central administration is the first campus unit to surpass last year's United Way contributions with \$9,950 pledged. The retirees have achieved 85 percent of their goal with \$8,183 contributed.
