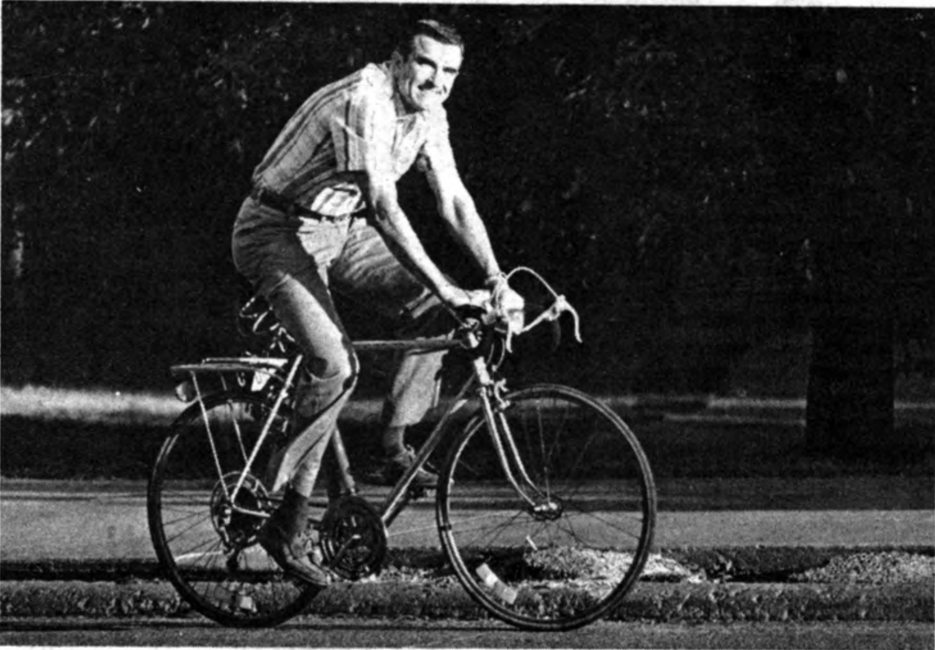

Revisions improve grievance procedure

The grievance procedure for UMC administrative, service and support staff was revised by a vote of the Board of Curators Sept. 13, increasing the number of individuals eligible to use the procedure and providing minor alterations to the process.

Under the new policy, employees working at least 75 percent time, who are scheduled to work at least 30 hours a week, may process grievances. Probationary, temporary and part-time employees (those working less than 75 percent time) may process grievances on issues of discrimination or the application and interpretation of University policies or procedures.

The new grievance policy has a six-step procedure:

1. Oral discussion with the immediate supervisor.

2. Written grievance to the supervisor, department head or designated University representative, with a copy to the campus grievance representative.

3. Appeal to the campus representative.

4. Appeal to the UM grievance representative

5. Appeal to a grievance committee.

6. Appeal to the Board of Curators.

A campus grievance representative has not yet been named, but the revised policy will direct appeals of department decisions to him or her directly, rather than sending the grievance to the UM central administration.

"We wanted to make the change because it decreases the turnaround time, increases the efficiency of the process and keeps grievances on campus — closer to the problem — before taking them to the University system," said Jackie McClain, UM manager of staff relations and affirmative action.

"Over the years we have heard comments from employees about the process and felt they were legitimate," she said. "We also discussed problems in the procedure with personnel and business office officials on the campuses, and had a feeling from our own work that it could be improved."

Those discussions led to the decision to seek the policy changes, changes which now provide a way for all employees to channel some grievances, even those who do not have full-time status.

Individuals interested in the full grievance procedure will find it outlined in Section 5.0203 of the Collected Rules and Regulations, available at the reserve desk on the first floor of Ellis Library.

Personnel begins lunchbag forums

UMC gas cuts beating UM's energy goal

The new UM energy policy has been implemented on the Columbia campus, and already there is good news for UMC: the policy's five-year goal of reducing gasoline consumption by 27 percent has been nearly accomplished, even though the plan is less than a month old.

The energy policy was put into force early in September and sets standards and goals for achieving energy savings in five areas. "This is probably as comprehensive an energy policy as exists in higher education anywhere in the United States," Tom Hussey, UM assistant vice president for business services, told the Board of Curators at its September meeting.

Under the new plan vehicle fuel conservation, fleet reduction and conversion to fuels other than gasoline are mandated.

"We are going to encourage people to cut down on the use of University vehicles by ride-sharing and by urging them to handle business by mail or on the phone," says Emmett Klinkerman, UMC business operations officer.

According to Klinkerman, the University's goal of cutting consumption of vehicle gasoline has nearly been met because the campus began cutting use last year when Gov. Joseph P. Teasdale ordered a 10 percent reduction in all state agencies.

"We actually cut use by 23.9 percent," says Klinkerman, noting that the campus purchased 442,000 gallons of gasoline in the 1978-79 fiscal year and only 336,459 gallons in the 1979-80 year.

A second goal in the vehicle conservation policy is to convert vehicles to propane fuel. "We are going to try to con-

vert them all," says Klinkerman. "We will start with the police vehicles and then try to convert trucks in maintenance, and then finally convert the passenger cars."

A reduction of the size of campus fleet by 56 vehicles is a third goal in the plan and 31 of those have already been eliminated, according to the business office official.

"If we can get people into the habit of walking across campus to handle their business, it will save a lot of fuel," says Klinkerman, who believes that the fewer vehicles available will make it harder to find a car and force people to walk.

Other portions of the policy mandate that existing buildings be studied to plan energy projects and expenditures in a 10-year effort aimed at increasing energy conservation by utilizing automated controls, monitoring systems and other sophisticated equipment. It is hoped that the new systems will reduce consumption by up to 30 percent.

Another part of the policy establishes standards for new buildings in terms of energy consumption and materials used in construction.

The policy also changes the philosophy of purchasing major equipment. It will allow comparison of the total cost of the equipment, including the cost of operation, projected over the lifetime of the equipment, instead of having purchases based only on the lowest initial cost.

The new energy program also instituted plans designed to increase the operating efficiency of equipment such as boilers, turbines, electrical generators and water chilling systems. That plan alone is expected to save \$1 million systemwide.

CBHE recommending 10.5% pay increase

The Coordinating Board for Higher Education has recommended a 10.5 percent average salary increase for higher education department employees and \$35.3 million in capital improvements for the University.

The Board action on salaries conflicts with the directive of Gov. Joe Teasdale that a 9 percent salary increase be used by state departments in planning for the 1981-82 budget.

The Board staff had originally recommended a 12 percent average salary increase, but the Fiscal Affairs Committee of the Board informally recommended only 10.5 percent, the figure accepted by the full board.

The Board also accepted the recommendation of the Fiscal Affairs Com-

mittee on capital improvements, which was reported in *Mizzou Weekly* two weeks ago. That recommendation included funds for physical plant preservation, renovation and rehabilitation of existing facilities, energy conservation and compliance with state and federal regulations on the Columbia campus.

The Board recommended \$11.3 million for construction of a library storage building and agricultural engineering building, and planning of a health sciences library, new law school building and an engineering laboratory and classroom at UMC.

The coordinating board has scheduled a hearing on the operating budgets for UM for Oct. 13 and a vote on those budgets Oct. 25.

The cover photo, courtesy of the University of Missouri Archives, is of a 1918 calendar, donated to the Archives in 1978 by Clara Mae Cash Cochran in honor of her late brother, Thornton Caverly Cash.

According to Mrs. Cochran, the calendar had a particular significance to her mother, because Cash was waiting in New York to be shipped overseas when World War I ended Nov. 18, 1918. Instead, he was able to return to the University and complete his degree in geology.

FACULTY/STAFF ID CARDS CHANGED — Because of a new system used in checking out materials from Ellis Library, faculty and staff identity cards are being altered to include a bar code representing their ID numbers. The system replaces the computer punch hole

system which has been used on ID cards for 15 years.

When a faculty or staff member's card is presented at the library, the circulation desk will check it for a bar code and place the code on cards that have not been altered. Individuals holding cards of the older variety need not have them replaced because of the new system, but they will be altered if materials are borrowed from the library.

THE U.S. COURT OF APPEALS from the 8th Judicial Circuit — one of 11 in the country — has accepted an invitation from the UMC School of Law to send a three-judge panel to the school Oct. 13 to hear cases.

The proceedings will be the first time that a U.S. Court of Appeals has convened at the UMC law school.

The court — whose decision is final except when an appeal is accepted by the U.S. Supreme Court — will hear civil cases and possibly a criminal case from its seven-state jurisdiction at the session beginning at 9 a.m. in the Tate Hall courtroom.

The public is welcome to observe. No cameras or tape recorders will be allowed in the courtroom during proceedings.

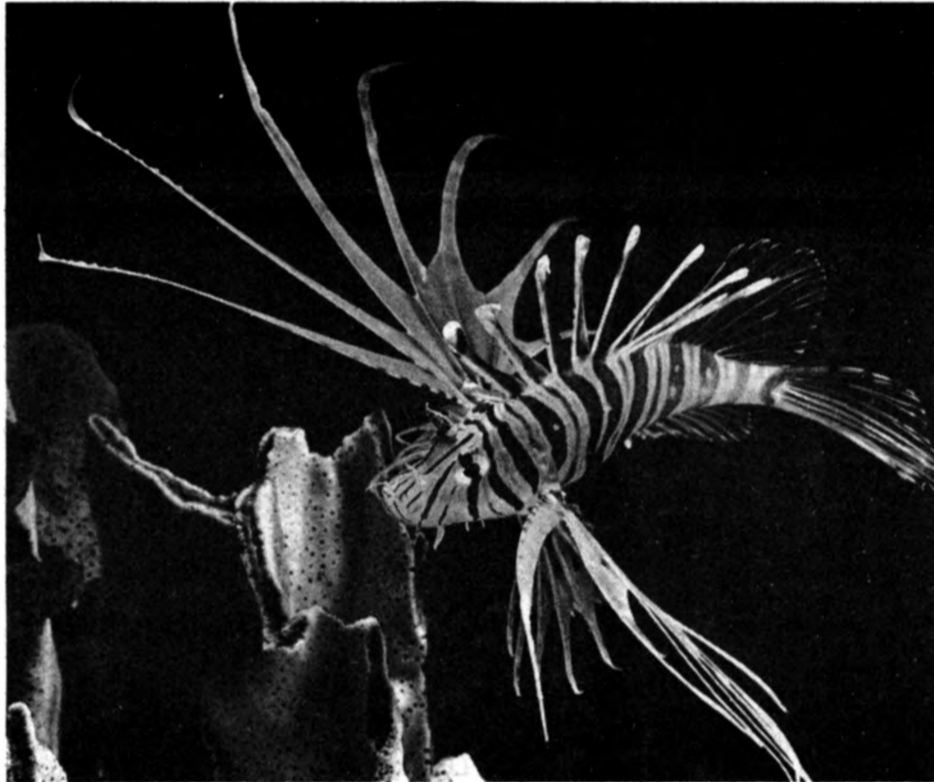
