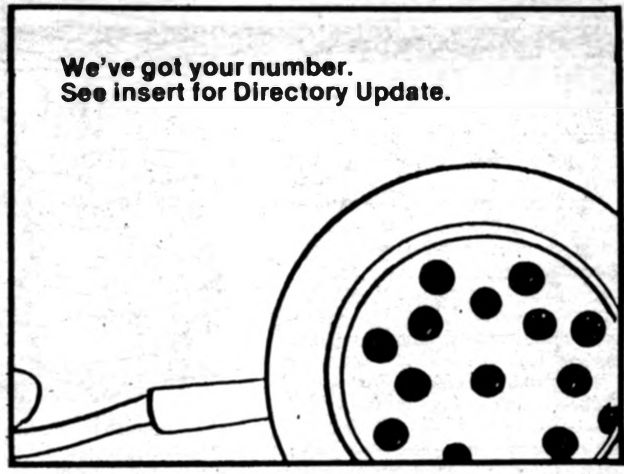

Curators set review deadline

Program and activity reviews will be completed by October, the curators decided last week.

Programs will be slated for enhancement, maintenance, reduction or elimination by the deadline recommended by the UM long-range planning committee.

In addition, the deadline for the UM long-range planning steering committee report was approved. The report, which is due June 22, will include realistic estimates of both the new costs required to implement the objectives of the long-range plan and the amount and sources of anticipated revenues.

A similar report from each campus' long-range liaison committee also will be completed in June, says David Leuthold, Faculty Council chair.

The procedure for the programs and activities review has not been worked out yet, he says. "We don't know how the Faculty Council will be involved."

Program discontinuance procedures, however, were passed by the curators in February 1982. These

guidelines require that a chancellor make a tentative decision on a program targeted for elimination and send the decision to the corresponding faculty council for review. The council reviews the decision and sends recommendations back to the chancellor. Then, chancellors' recommendations are sent to the UM president, who makes recommendations to the curators.

One concern about the review process is the large amount of the work that likely will have to be done over the summer. Faculty members typically are involved in off-campus research, and they will miss out on much of the decision making, Leuthold says. Some faculty members may feel these decisions are so important that they will stay on campus and forgo their research, he adds. "That would be a great loss."

Other items approved by the board include the following:

- ✓ In 1984-85, fees for University-owned residence halls will increase 7.5 percent to \$1,989 per person for double or triple rooms. Fees for married student housing will increase an average of 8.2 percent. Increases will take effect during the summer.
- ✓ Final architectural plans for an addition to Brady

Commons were approved. The addition will include 51,200 square feet and will be built on the east side of the present building. The \$2,917,500 cost will be paid for with money from the Brady Commons' expansion and bookstore funds, and other non-state operating funds.

✓ Design plans were approved and construction management firms were appointed for phase one of the Hospital and Clinics capital improvement project. The firms Simon Construction Co./Barton Malow Southern Inc. will provide construction management services for the \$19 million project, which includes a 580-car parking facility with a concourse connecting it to the main hospital building and a new entrance lobby. The project will be funded by University revenue bonds that will be paid back from the Hospital and Clinics' patient revenue.

✓ The contract to build an agriculture research operations building at UMC's South Farm was awarded to J.C. Industries Inc. The new building will replace one destroyed by fire in August 1982. The \$253,000 project will be funded by an emergency appropriation provided by the state in March 1983.

Mizzou is leader among institutions

UMC's undergraduate program is the state's best, according to the recently released Gourman Report on higher education.

The overall academic rating placed all other undergraduate programs at Missouri institutions below the UMC rank of 4.38 out of a possible 5.0.

"Our reputation is built up over a long period of time. We have built a fairly substantial reputation," President James Olson told curators last week. The Gourman Report, however, is based on data from 1982-83 and it does not reflect the standstill budget of this past year, he warned.

"Despite problems, despite morale, which at this point is not good, this university has a good reputation," Olson

said. "Our actions are aimed at maintaining that reputation and enhancing it."

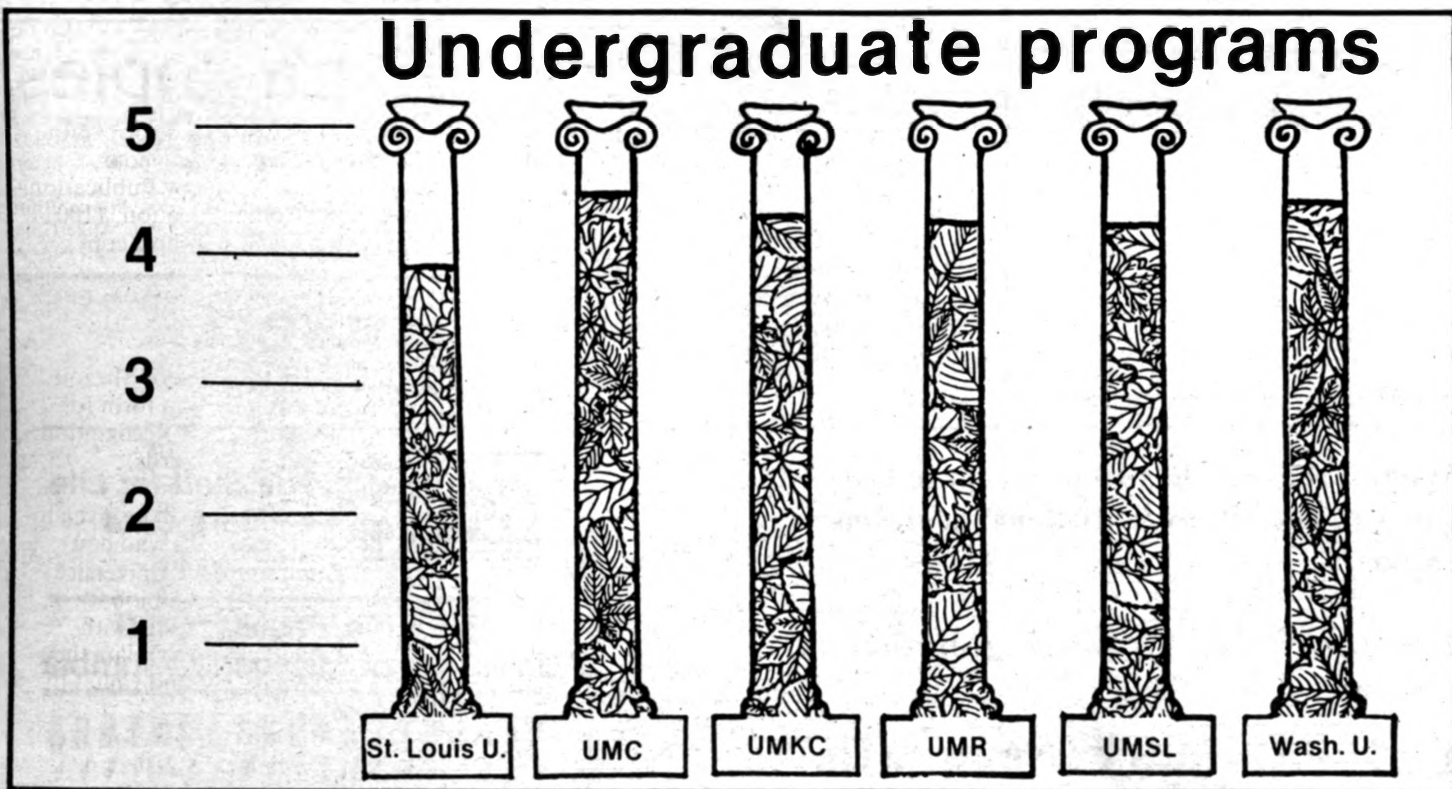
Trailing UMC on the undergraduate level were Washington University ranked at 4.33, UMKC at 4.27, UMR at 4.25, UMSL at 4.23 and St. Louis University at 3.91. The UMC graduate program, with a ranking at 3.74, came in second to Washington University with 4.49. Harvard, the university rated best in the study, scored a 4.95.

The University is ranked second in the Big Eight for undergraduate programs and third for graduate. In addition, the University places first in the Big Eight in the area of good athletic-academic balance.

Many UMC degree programs fared very well in the report's overall quality ranking. The School of Journalism ranked first in undergraduate and third for graduate program in the nationwide ratings.

Other programs with high national ratings were: forestry, seventh; fish and game management, ninth; parks management, ninth; home economics, 10th; horticulture, 11th; agricultural engineering, 11th; agriculture, 12th; agronomy/soil and crop management, 12th; physical education, 13th; occupational therapy, 14th; accounting, 16th; speech, 17th; and industrial engineering, 19th.

The report ranks graduate and undergraduate education in more than 1,000 American and international institutions. Issued by the National Education Standards group, it updates the 1980 version. The report's name comes from its editor, Jack Gourman, political science professor at California State University at Northridge.

GET ORGANIZED FOR TAX TIME

If you find it painful to get ready to file income tax, it's time to get organized—even if it's too late for this year.

Pat Lieurance, extension family economics and management specialist, suggests you start with a metal file cabinet and a bunch of expandable paper folders to label by categories. For maximum efficiency, keep the cabinet next to where you open mail and pay bills.

For permanent records, such as property deeds and vehicle titles, it's best to rely on a safe-deposit box, Lieurance says. It's also a good idea to keep a fireproof storage box in a safe



place at home for medical records, insurance policies, warranties and safe-deposit box contents inventory.

CASH IN ON ENERGY CREDITS

To take advantage of the tax credit for making energy-saving improvements to your home, plan to make these improvements before Jan. 1, 1986, says Bev Wiles, extension housing specialist. After that date, it is unlikely that the tax break will be available.

The credits, up to 15 percent to a maximum of \$300 (which would be \$2,000 worth of improvements), are subtracted directly from taxes and can be claimed even if you don't itemize. Both renters and owners are eligible.

To be eligible for the 15 percent tax credit, a home must have been completed before April 20, 1977.

However, a 40 percent credit for solar, wind or geothermal energy devices applies to any age home.

Details are available in IRS form 5695, Residential Energy Credit.

OH FUDGE! SPOT CAN'T HAVE CHOCOLATE TREATS

Pet owners should resist giving their dogs chocolate because it contains theobromine, a caffeine-related stimulant that can cause toxicity. The substance clears much more slowly from a dog's system than from a human's.

Symptoms of poisoning include restlessness, incontinence, seizures and death.

Theobromine toxicity has been implicated in horse fatalities, too, resulting from use of cocoa husks as bedding.

Agricultural policy center established

UMC and Iowa State University will study current and prospective federal farm programs at the Center for National Food and Agricultural Policy Research, approved by the University Cabinet earlier this month. The center will have locations on both campuses, with UMC studying domestic policies and Iowa State concentrating on the international aspect of farm programs.

Congress appropriated \$450,000 to establish the center to provide a second opinion to supplement the U.S. Department of Agriculture's analyses.

Mizzou researchers will study how agricultural policies affect farmers, how programs affect the supply and price of food to consumers, their bearing on international trade and their cost to the government. UMC's operations will be directed by Stanley Johnson, professor of economics, and Abner Womack, associate professor for agricultural economics extension. They will use the University's domestic agricultural models, in development since 1972 and operational since 1979, to analyze interactive commodity prices on an annual and quarterly basis. The models are unique in this country for their ability to link predictions across commodity markets.

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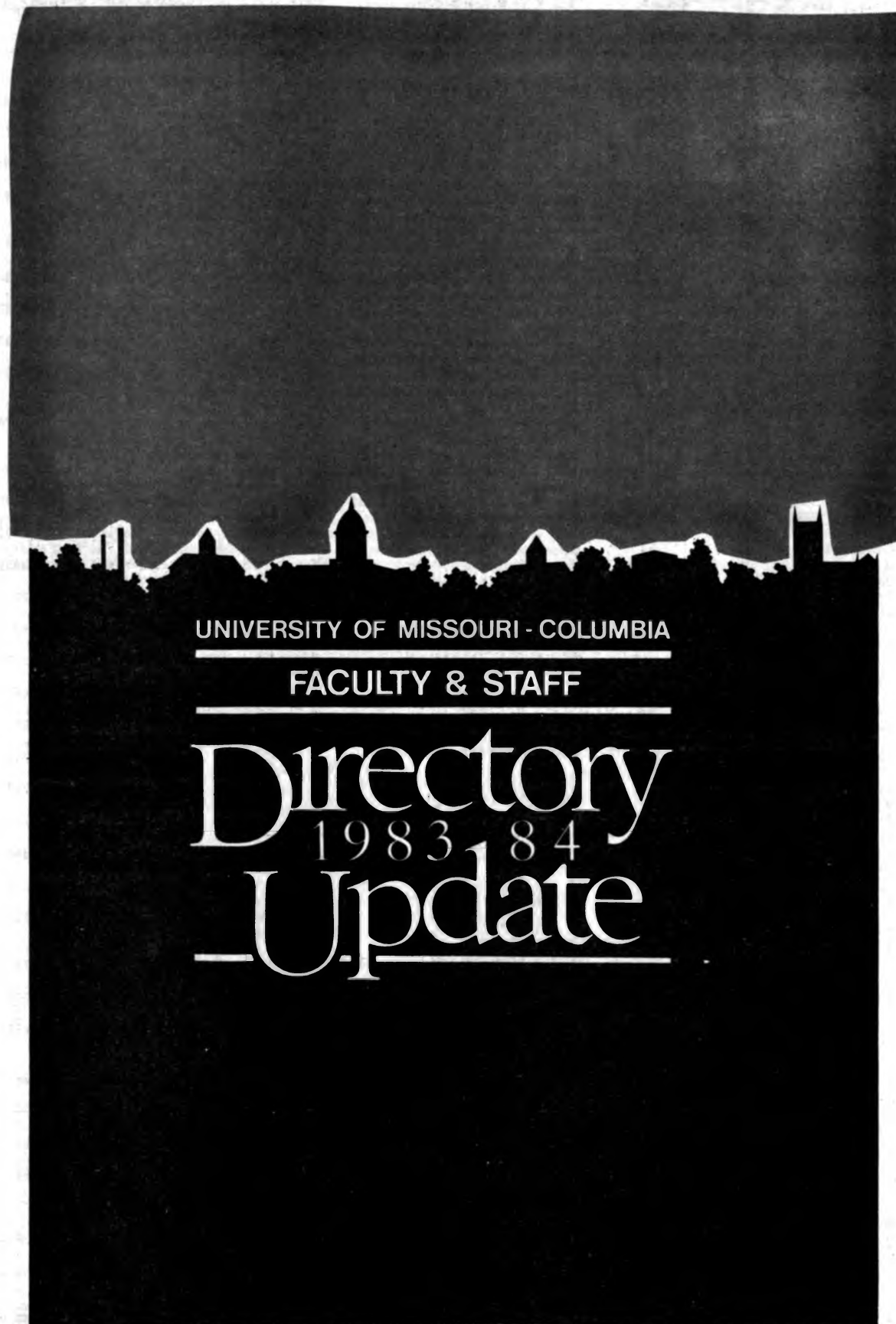
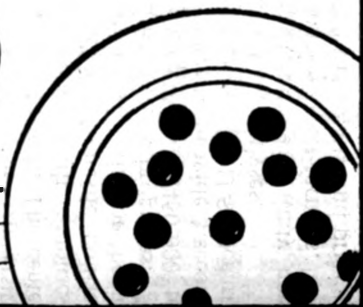

Lots of parking issues

Editor's note: During the next few weeks, the campus parking committee will be considering options to deal with various parking needs. Before presenting its suggestions to Vice Chancellor Norman Moore, the committee would like to hear from faculty and staff. Comments should be sent to Verna Rhodes, parking committee chair, S314 School of Nursing.

Current and proposed campus construction projects will eliminate hundreds of faculty, staff and visitor parking spaces, says Jim Joy, manager of parking operations. Although much of the construction may not occur soon, it's time to devise a plan to accommodate the displaced drivers, he says.

Some 100 spaces will be lost to construction of the Brady Commons addition. Ellis Library expansion will claim another 70 staff spaces and 120 visitor slots. Law School construction will eliminate more than 200 spaces. At the Health Sciences Center, 400 students and staff have been moved to a lot near Memorial Stadium to make way for current construction. Hospital security provides a 24-hour parking lot-escort service for the safety of employees and visitors. A shuttlebus transports employees and students from the Hearn Building lot to the Hospital and Clinics and campus free of charge, too.

When Brady Commons construction begins, those who lose their parking spaces will be moved to other campus

lots, Joy says. Any subsequent construction, however, will require other solutions.

One option is to build parking decks on existing lots. Possible locations include lot WG5 near Conley Avenue and lot WC7 near University Avenue. "The hospital is making a major step in building a 600-car parking structure primarily for visitors and patients," Joy says. The project is funded by revenue bonds.

Funding options for the campus parking structures include installing meters at visitor spaces and increasing the current \$4 monthly parking fee. As a full-costed enterprise, parking operations receives no University funding. Instead, all of its income is generated through parking fees, violation payments, meters and contracts. With this income, parking operations funds salaries, the shuttle services, office operations, lot maintenance, lot improvement, loan amortization, computing, institutional support and lot rental.

"To my knowledge there are no faculty or staff parking more than three blocks from where they work," Joy says. "For 20 cents a day I think they are getting a real good deal." If parking fees are raised, Joy favors offering employees other options, such as parking in the Hearn lot at a reduced cost. "But it would cost to shuttle employees from Hearn," he adds.

Credit bill detrimental

Transfer of courses among Missouri public institutions has been under discussion for several years. While articulation has been a long-sought goal, problems continue to persist. Therefore, a business transfer committee composed of representatives of all Missouri two- and four-year colleges was appointed by the Coordinating Board for Higher Education.

The committee concurs that the degree of uniformity of requirements is probably more prevalent than the disuniformity of requirements for four-year schools. It also agrees that the majority of problems are caused by a minority of students. Often these students expect to receive full transfer of credit for courses completed in two-year vocational programs.

Problems regarding uniformity of foundation requirements have developed between two- and four-year colleges. Overlap of sophomore- and junior-level courses has been questioned. In order to better understand these requirements, subcommittees were formed.

A subcommittee of four-year colleges concluded that their requirements were becoming more similar due to American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business accreditation requirements. Accredited schools already were conforming with the requirements, while other schools were attempting to conform in order to apply for accreditation. Because they are being driven by a similar force, the four-year colleges' requirements for the first two years are becoming more alike.

The community colleges will survey their offerings and submit the results to the four-year colleges to determine which courses will be accepted for transfer. The four-year institutions will describe how they validate the junior-level courses accepted from community colleges.

After discussing House Bill 1314, the business transfer committee passed a resolution urging that transfer of credit be worked out carefully among institutions. In part, the resolution reads, "Section 2.1 of House Bill 1314 calls for a uniformity in colleges and universities that ignores and in reality negates

the diversity of programs in colleges and universities throughout the state. It does not account for special requirements of some programs, or for change of major by students themselves, which unavoidably requires a student to take more credit hours than if (he or she) had not transferred schools or programs." The resolution also notes that a single course numbering system would be costly and difficult to implement.

The committee determined that the bill would negatively impact at least half of the four-year colleges and requested that the bill be withdrawn. Legislation such as House Bill 1314 could destroy the ability of faculties to change curriculum to meet changing demands in a fast-paced, high-technology society.

'Mikado' pokes fun at era

Gilbert and Sullivan's world-famous operetta, "The Mikado," will be performed at 8 p.m. Feb. 24 and 25 in Jesse Auditorium. The operetta is the second presentation of the 8th annual Chancellor's Festival of Music.

The scene for "The Mikado" is the Japanese town of Titipu. "The operetta is a satire of Victorian society under the camouflage of a Japanese setting," says music instructor Michael Budds. It is a tale of politicians and aristocrats trying to control each other and the people around them, but there is also a love story wrapped into the plot.

The comic opera, which first opened in London in 1885, tries to get people to take themselves less seriously. However, it is also a product of Gilbert and Sullivan's era, says Budds, who will give a free concert preview at 7 p.m. Feb. 24 in the Fine Arts Recital Hall. The genre of operetta and Gilbert and

Sullivan's use of all forms of English songs in their operettas will be discussed.

The Jesse Hall performance will star music Professor Harry Morrison as the pompous and compromising politician Pooh-Bah. Mezzo soprano Kathryn Fowler of the University of New Mexico music department and 1982-83 UMC visiting assistant professor of music, will appear as Katisha. The production also will include a UMC student cast of nine actors and a chorus of 28.
