UMca reports list research, extension goals

Vice presidents release reports outlining priorities for systemwide activities.

Priorities for extension, research facilities and other systemwide activities were proposed in program-review reports released last week by Vice Presidents Mel George and James Buchholz. President C. Peter Magrath, who received the reports in early January, will make his recommendations to the Board of Curators Feb. 8.

Within extension, George recommends 13 agriculture programs for enhancement, with emphasis on soil fertility and forage crops, animal production efficiency, financial managing and marketing, alternative energy sources and soil and water conservation.

Some enhancement also is proposed for selected programs in business and industry, home economics, 4-H/youth and community/public sector. A complete listing of proposals for extension is on Page 2.

In research, chief areas proposed for enhancement are environmental toxicology, including research at the Environmental Trace Substances Research Center and Sinclair Farm, and several programs at the Research Reactor and Water Resources Research Center.

Proposed enhancements in the academic affairs areas mentioned above are estimated to cost about \$795,000. An equal amount of savings is expected from proposed reductions and eliminations. Suggested reductions in the research area are the freshwater toxicology research center within the Environmental Trace Substances Research Center and radiation effects program and nuclear analysis program within the Research Reactor. Also recommended for reduction are Archives and some extension programs.

Programs at Environmental Trace Substances Research Center proposed for elimination are chemical composition

of sewage sludges research, toxic effects of Cd and Pb in rats, L'Vov platform development, microbiological testing, and training for Missouri Department of Natural Resources. Sinclair Farm research in atherosclerosis and diabetes also is proposed for elimination. In the same category are the Intercampus Instruction/College-at-Home program, to be merged with the UMC Center for Independent Study, and some extension programs.

In administrative affairs, Buchholz proposes enhancements estimated to total \$100,000 in the treasurer's office, telecommunications, internal auditing and computing and information technology. Estimated UMca savings are expected to exceed additional expenditures by about \$335,000.

Proposed enhancement of the Office of the General Counsel is expected to cost about \$50,000. External activities in University Relations also are recommended for enhancement.

Reductions are suggested in the vice president's office, human resource services, business services, financial services and office of the secretary to the Board of Curators.

Priority recommendations from each of the four campus' program-review reports are listed on a chart on Page 3.

Magrath stresses teamwork

University President C. Peter Magrath advocated cooperation as a means to improve service to the state in his first meeting with Faculty Council Tuesday. Chancellor Barbara S. Uehling and Provost Ron Bunn also attended the special meeting.

"The University is the only public research university in Missouri," noted Magrath, who assumed his duties Jan. 1. "The progress of the state is inextricably bound to the University. I am convinced that faculty, students, staff and administrators can work together to meet the challenges we face."

If all campuses work together, Magrath said, the result will be a stronger, more effective University to serve Missourians.

"I'd like to see one big flag flying for the University of Missouri."

Magrath re-emphasized his position during discussion of corporate funding of research. To most effectively compete for this funding, he said, the University's proposal should be non-competitive with one another, and should indicate some priority.

The new president praised the campus' priority recommendations included in program-review reports submitted in January as "very real and very thoughtful. They have faced up to some difficult choices." Magrath's recommendations will not be released before the Feb. 8 Board of Curators meeting. But "I can assure you that my recommendations are based on great confidence in the chancellor and the various people who have worked on recommendations on this campus."

"I'm very optimistic about where the planning will lead us," he said. Though times have been difficult, Magrath said,

"There can be progress and improvement for the University so it can serve the people of the state of Missouri."

Though cautioning against being "Pollyannish," Magrath said that in talking with state legislators, "I honestly sense that there is a profound interest in and appreciation of the University of Missouri. There is interest in seeing if a genuine investment

can be made so we can move forward."

Magrath submitted the University's fiscal 1985 budget request, which seeks a 22 percent increase, to the House Education Appropriations Committee Monday.

The president said he also hopes for an increase in private support. Though gifts have doubled since 1979, "I think we can do better." Organizational changes in de-

velopment could be beneficial, he said.

Despite fiscal concerns, Magrath urged faculty to project the positive aspects of the University. "We who seek public understanding and support do have an obligation to project what we are about. We can be positive about what we do. If we go around 'woe unto us' all the time, we communicate a lackluster, tired attitude."

Cerra accepts development job

Jean Cerra, associate director of intercollegiate athletics, has accepted a temporary assignment as a director of the UMC Development Fund. She will perform her new duties during a six-month Staff Development Leave from her position in intercollegiate athletics beginning Feb. 18.

The Staff Development Leave program permits employees to take advantage of professional growth opportunities that can enhance their value to the University.

Cerra, a doctoral candidate in educational administration, will work under the direction of Roger Gafke, acting vice chancellor for development, university and alumni relations.

"Jean Cerra will bring her substantial skills as a manager and administrator to oversee the delivery of fund-raising services to other development officers and to UMC's deans and directors as they also carry out fund-raising activities," Gafke said.

Cerra will continue to represent the University on the NCAA Council and Eligibility Committees, since her designation as UMC's primary woman athletic administrator will remain unchanged during her leave. Her responsibilities in intercollegiate athletics will be distributed among Assistant Directors Dick Bestwick, Lynn Lashbrook and John Rawlings.



Q. Are special parking spaces available for faculty and staff with temporary disabilities, such as a broken leg?

A. Yes, injured employees are eligible for temporary house permits, says Parking Operations Assistant Manager Carol McAllister. "We'll try to get them as close as possible to their buildings." The temporary permits are free of charge for employees with regular permits. Other employees are charged \$2 per week or \$7 per month.

Q. Why don't they cinder University parking lots when it's snowy or icy? Shouldn't our \$7 month parking fee cover that?

A. "Campus Facilities goes through and puts cinders down on all the lots, but if specific areas are forgotten, employees should call our office," says Carol McAllister, Parking Operations assistant manager. "Sometimes in severe weather, the cinders are ineffective because they're blown around so much."

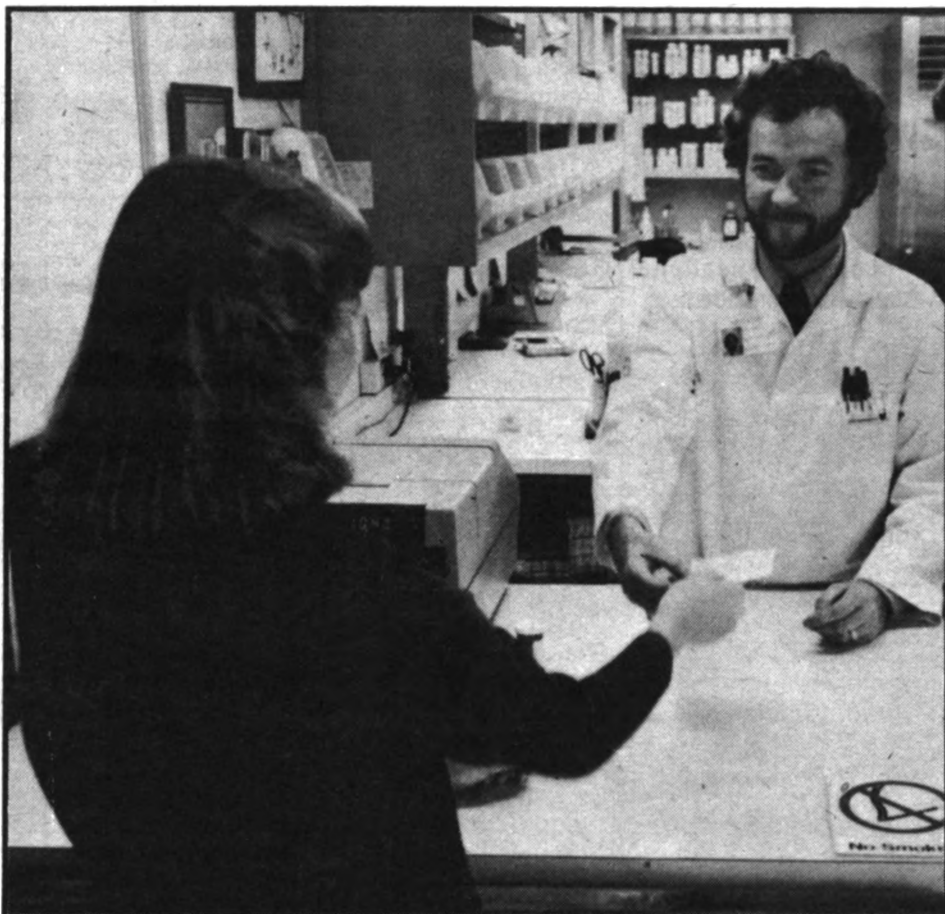

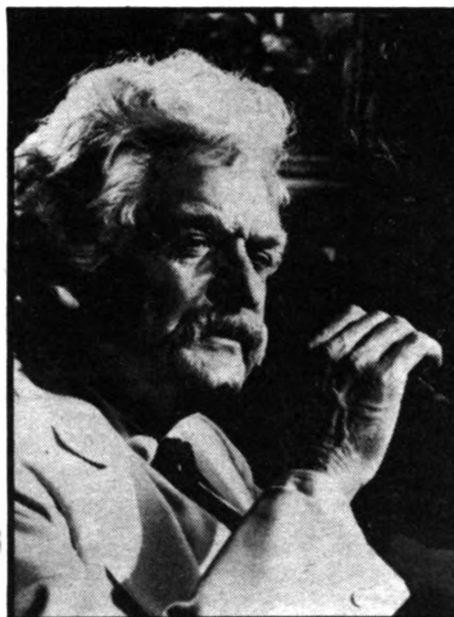
