

Kicking the habit

Campus and community smoking cessation programs can help employees.

A week before the University's smoking policy went into effect Aug. 22, smokers in the Telecommunications Office tried to snuff their yens for cigarettes.

"Someone mentioned that the almanac said the moon was in the right spot to stop smoking," says administrative associate Kay Frentzel. Frentzel and other office smokers took that as a sign to kick the habit. They have halfheartedly stuck to that resolve, and the University's smoking policy, which restricts smoking to designated areas, is making them more conscious of their efforts.

Whether the impetus comes from family, co-workers or almanacs. the smoking policy may force some University employees who smoke to reconsider their habit. And there are campus and community groups that can help them to quit.

Tom Dilorenzo, assistant professor of psychology, runs the Smoking Clinic on campus. The program is offered periodically, with the next session to start at 7 p.m. Sept. 13 in Noyes Hall. Funded by the National Cancer Institute, the clinic is open to faculty, staff and community members. A former smoker, Dilorenzo stresses that couples who smoke should both enroll in the program. "It's much harder to quit if your spouse continues to smoke," he says.

Participants meet in groups once a week for seven weeks to discuss behavior modification techniques that will help them quit. The program fee is \$50, but \$40 is returned after participants complete a series of follow-up sessions. The fee can be adjusted. To enroll call 882-6485.


Across campus, the University Hospital and Clinics offers two approaches to smoking cessation. The Stop for Life program features a three-week course and a "cold turkey" option that meets six times. The three-week tapering session meets once a week from noon to 1 p.m. in 315 Dockery Hall. The next session begins Sept. 13. On Oct. 3 the "cold turkey" quitters will join the group.

There is no fee for the courses. Hospital employees are given priority, but classes don't usually fill up and campus employees are welcome. To enroll call 882-4161.

"Group support really helps, so we like large groups," says course coordinator Linda Price. Perseverance is the key to quitting, she says. "It doesn't matter if people are nagging you — you have to make up your mind that you're going to stop smoking. Until you reach that point, it won't work." Price says some people sign up for the program several times. "That's OK. It may take more than one attempt to non-smokers how to stick up for their rights. For information quit," she says.

Finding the right approach is the key to dropping the habit for some smokers. For those looking for ways to battle the stresses associated with quitting, the Psychological Clinic on campus might be able to help. The clinic provides one-onone counseling, and fees vary. For information call 882-4677.

Smokers who want to quit on their own can call the American Lung Association. It offers "Freedom from Smoking for You and Your Family," a \$7 self-help guide that lists step-by-step ways to overcome cessation roadblocks. The association also has an employer-assisted smoking elimination program, information for non-smokers who want to help someone stop smoking and pamphlets telling

all the American Lung Association at 874-2616.

If a co-worker is trying to quit smoking, the lung association offers these tips for smokers and non-smokers: •Ask what you can do to help. Agree on a plan of support.


• If you are a smoker, try not to smoke around people who have strong urges to smoke.

•Be patient with the quitting smoker's irritability. •Know when to give the quitter breathing room. Recognize your tension level.

•If you are angry at the smokers for some reason, do not express your anger by sabotaging their effort to stop smoking.

·Above all, maintain open lines of communicationespecially if there is a feeling of tension.

A center of attention

New director wants Black Culture Center to heighten student perspectives and to foster good grades.

Painters are brightening the walls of the Black Culture Center, but the new coordinator says changes to the center won't just be cosmetic.

"The objective of the center is to move students toward a degree," says Walter Smith, who began July 15 as the coordinator of the student center, which is tucked between residence halls and parking lots at 823 Virginia "It's not a social center, although social and cultural events are part of our activities. We'll offer something for all students. My goal is to broaden students' perspectives as they move toward their degree."

On the cultural end, a black heritage lecture series begins this month and a regular internationl culinary bazaar will feature food from all regions of the world. Academic programming includes a survival skills series and, as soon as a computer arrives, weekly computer labs.

Involving faculty, staff and the commu-

nity will enhance the center's activities, Smith says. "I'm challenging black and white faculty and staff to be student oriented," he says. "And I hope that they will take the initiative to speak with me to find out what the center offers. Any input they have toward our goal is encouraged and accepted. They have to love what we're going to do.'

Creating programming for students is Smith's first love. A graduate student in library and informational sciences, Smith, 41, spent last year as a researcher in the Office of Academic Assistance. He says he interviewed for this job because it allows him to be creative and innovative. He replaces Willie Robinson, who left in December to become assistant dean for student development and academic affairs at the University of Florida in Gainesville.

Before he came to Mizzou, Smith coordinated handicapped student services and directed learning skills programs at UM-Kansas City from 1973 to 1980. He's also been an educational consultant and has taught special education classes.

In his new job, he spent the first month cleaning the center and rounding up student workers to run activities. Among student projects is the revitalization of "Primetime," the center's newsletter.

No matter the project, Smith says he will demand the best from student workers. He's thinking of setting a grade-point requirement. "You're a role model for the students who come here," he told one student worker during a recent meeting. Smith says setting high standards for the students will prepare them for the business world. "I want it to be a good professional work experience for them. They are the foundation of what we do here."

Benefit changes OK'd

While the final word on a medical premium increase isn't expected until after the Board of Curators' September meeting, some changes were approved this summer in other benefit plans. In June, the board approved the following revisions.

•Effective July 1, employees no longer are required to enroll in both the medical and dental plans. New employees may choose to enroll in one or both plans.

•Also effective July 1, any employee or dependent who does not enroll in the dental plan during the employee's first 60 days on the job no longer will have to provide evidence of good health to enroll in the plan at a later date. Likewise, family status changes (marriage, birth of child) will not require proof of good health. However, during the first year of coverage, late enrollees will be eligible only for Type A expenses. Those expenses primarily deal with preventive dental health care such as routine cleaning, examinations and X-rays. Such services are limited to two a calendar year.

Following the first year of coverage, individuals can claim full benefits of the dental plan.

•Changes to the retirement, disability and death benefit plan took effect Sept. 1. Revisions include a 2.3 percent increase in the retirement benefit for people receiving benefits as of Sept. 1 and whose benefits began on or before Sept. 1, 1986. This increase applies only to University retirees receiving retirement benefits; employees receiving disability benefits from the plan; or spouses receiving derivative retirement or disability benefits.

Also within that plan, the benefit beneficiary designation now will allow employees to designate any person, trust or estate as beneficiary of the plan's lump sum death benefit. Previously, this designation was limited to specified family members.

In addition, the provision allowing creditable service for sabbatical, research or development leaves was amended to require that employees on leave return to the University no later than the beginning of the next academic year for the leave time to be included in creditable service calculations.

Regarding early retirement benefits, the plan will continue to provide those benefits for employees age 55 to 60 who have 10 years of service and for employees older than 60 with five years of service. However, the plan was amended to require that an individual applying for such benefits must become eligible for them while earning creditable service. For example, a faculty member with 10 years of service who turns 55 while on a sabbatical leave must return to the University for at least one year following the leave to apply for early retirement benefits.

•On July 1, the filing process for a duplicate coverage inquiry changed. Currently on a claim where another group insurance carrier's benefits pay first, a DCI is sent to the other carrier by the University's medical benefit administrator, Provident Life and Accident Insurance Co. When the DCI is returned, the balance of the charges are considered for payment by Provident. As of July 1, when a claim is received and Provident determines that the University is the secondary carrier, an explanation of benefits will be issued presuming the other carrier will pay 100 percent of the charges.

There will be a message on the EOB explaining this and asking the insured to send a copy of the EOB from the other carrier if this is not the case. The claim will be reopened and recalculated only when the information is received. Employees submitting claims in which the University is secondary should enclose a copy of the primary carrier's EOB

Employee benefits staff think the change will reduce delays in receiving information from other carriers.

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That dreaded weight

If you're unhappy with your weight but can't seem to find the time to exercise, don't feel alone. You're in the majority on campus.

That was the leading result from a survey taken last spring by the campus wellness committee. Randy Smith, assistant professor of physical therapy and co-chairman of the committee, says 600 surveys were distributed randomly to faculty, staff and students. "While these results are not comprehensive, we feel they are representative," he says.

Smith says 58.4 percent of the respondents indicated they were not happy with their current weight, and 42.9 percent considered themselves 10 or more pounds overweight. But those people also said a lack of time was the main reason they did not participate in exercise or other wellness programs. "More than half of the respondents said

they would be interested in time management programs," Smith says. "There also was a lot of interest in the areas of relaxation and stress reduction.'

Smith says the committee plans to offer lunchtime and evening wellness programs and will begin the semester with a fitness program at Jesse Hall. Walking during the noon hour is the main feature of the plan, which will include speakers every two weeks.

Other departments offer wellness programs, too," he adds. "Health and Physical Education has a Fitness for Living program, and topics like stress reduction and time management are often covered in seminars offered by Psychology or Counseling Services.

Nursing new goals

Joe Genovese is a man determined to make it in what traditionally is considered a woman's world.

The 38-year-old registered nurse is enrolled in the School of Nursing's accelerated nurses program, designed to help registered nurses without a bachelor's degree stay on the managerial career path.

"I can't advance unless I have the degree behind me," he says. "With this program there are lots of possibilities." The accelerated program leads to bachelor's and master's degrees simultaneously.

The program allows students to apply 12 hours from the master's program toward their undergraduate degree. Students also can gain up to 34 nursing hours through advanced standing tests and 15 hours of other prerequisites. They may test out of up to six hours of non-nursing courses.

can be applied toward the degrees. It will take Genovese about two years to complete the program.

Without a plan like this, Genovese says he probably would have no chance to get a master's degree. When his studies began this fall, he began juggling a full-time job at the Truman Veterans Hospital with the care of his three children. "With all my other responsibilities, I just wouldn't have had five years to invest in a master's program," Genovese says.

He typifies the sort of student the program plans to attract. "It's no easy thing to balance a family, a career and school," says Rose Porter, assistant professor of nursing and





MIZZOU PATENTS BRAIN SCANNER

A brain-scanning device developed by a Mizzou physician has given the UM system the largest patent in its history.

The machine, known as a multiplane imager, is four times faster and much cheaper than equipment now in use. It is dedicated exclusively to brain imaging for medical diagnosis.

Called MUMPI - Missouri University Multi-Plane Imager the machine was developed by K. William Logan, associate professor of radiology and medical physicist at Truman Veterans Hospital. MUMPI can make four images of

WEEKL SEPT. 7. 194 the brain at the same time, and it takes less than a minute to complete the imaging.

The cost of the imager is expected to be approximately \$300,000. Similar equipment now costs up to \$1 million. Robert Killoren, UM director of patents and licensing, says MUMPI's patent has 93 claims regarding its technology "This is an extraordinarily high number of legal claims to the technology involved," he says.






