### Gaining ground

Increase in appropriation, absence of withholding give UM budget a boost.

Area legislators say that given another year of tight state budgets, the University did about as well as could be expected in the spending plan Gov. Mel Carnahan sent to the legislature earlier this month.

Carnahan recommended that the UM System receive \$296.1 million for the fiscal year that begins July 1. That's an increase of \$6.8 million, or about 2.3 percent, over the current year's state appropriation. In addition, Carnahan called for spending \$15.6 million over the next two years — or a little less than \$8 million a year — to maintain and repair University buildings

University buildings.
"Given the amount of money available, it's a very reason-

able budget request," says Rep. Chris Kelly, D-Columbia and chairman of the House Budget Committee. Kelly said he anticipates few problems in guiding the University's appropriation through the legislature.

"It's minimal," Sen. Joe Moseley, D-Columbia, says of the governor's budget recommendation. "But it is an increase, and that's better than the University has done in the last few years."

There is support for higher education in the Capitol building, says Rep. Ken Jacob, D-Columbia and chairman of the House Higher Education Committee. However, funding constraints tie the legislature's hands. "If you don't have any money, there's not much you can do," Jacob says.

While the governor's allocation might be smaller than hoped for, "it's not as bleak as it might appear," says Jim Snider, UM System lobbyist in Jefferson City.

Snider points out that the University already has allocated money for repair and maintenance in its five-year plan. If the state will provide some money for building repair, the campuses then can reallocate that part of their budget to other priorities. He adds that inflation has been running lower than normal, which could permit the University to scale back money that has been set aside for that purpose.

"I think the first thing we need to be grateful for is that the University is not in the position of 20 or so other states around the country that are in a negative position with appropriations for higher education. That could easily have happened," Snider says.

There is another bright spot. Area lawmakers say they think there is little chance that the governor will announce any budget withholdings for the remainder of this fiscal year.

All Columbia legislators agree that higher education will

be on the back burner until the legislature resolves the foundation formula to fund elementary and secondary schools.

What chance is there that the legislature will pass a tax increase for higher education? "Zero," Jacob says. "I don't see anybody willing to do that. I want to see it done, but I don't want to see it go down in a ball of flames. I don't think this is a good time."

Jacob says the resounding defeat of Proposition B is still on the minds of lawmakers. "I think any halfway reasonable person knows that to send another vote to the people would fail. It's going to take some time for the governor to travel around the state and convince folks that this is needed."

Given the failure of Proposition B, how would supporters of higher education change their tactics in any future push for a tax increase? "We all worked very hard on that, and I think if we had to do it again we would come up with a similar bill," Jacob says. "We thought that was a good bill. Something's going to have to change; either the voters will have to change or we in the legislature will."

Kelly says the question to ask is what can be learned from Proposition B's loss at the polls. "I don't think the people of Missouri rejected education," he says. Any future tax package would have to be broad-based, and not locked into funding only education, Kelly says. The price tag would have to be reasonable, he adds.

Could the legislature pass a tax increase for education this session? "I think that's a possibility," Kelly says.

"The University of Missouri will continue to decline in quality until we get substantial new revenue," Kelly adds. "A lot of people say, 'Money is not the answer.' Well, what is the answer? It's just hard to avoid it."

#### Working for food

MU researcher has a plan for Somalia.

While U.S. troops travel to Somalia to help residents of that country receive the food they so desperately need, Americans watch the events on television with a certain amount of pain and disbelief. Beneath the compassion one feels for the Somalians lies another thought: Can anything be done to relieve such horrible economic conditions?

Brady Deaton believes so. Deaton, professor and chairman of agricultural economics, realizes that emergency food shipments are the only short-run solution. "But a different type of food aid program is needed for the longer term," he says.

Deaton led a research team to Kenya in the mid-1980s to learn what food aid strategies work in that part of Africa, and which ones do not. The reseachers came away with solid evidence supporting the Food for Work program, which, as its name implies, pays farmers in food rather than in wages.

"There are a number of advantages to Food for Work," Deaton says. "Farmers and their families are healthier, because they're

eating better. In exchange for food, they're building dams, repairing irrigation systems, putting up fences and doing other work that helps the land and represents a sound investment in future agricultural growth. Also, by receiving their food from this program, they can sell more of the crops that they grow, which increases their personal income in many cases."

Kenya borders Somalia on the southwest. While the Food for Work program has been a blessing there, some conditions would have to change for it to be similarly successful in Somalia. "You would need more political and economic stability in Somalia, as well as a more effective infrastructure than is evident at this time," Deaton says. "But once those were in place, Food for Work could

bring about a dramatic change that would hold up well over the long term."

Deaton has published six scientific papers on his research, which was supported by the National Science Foundation, and recently wrote a piece for *The Kansas City Star* that referred to the Somalian situation. In 1984 and 1985, his team studied the activities of 300 Kenyan farm families that had agreed to participate in Food for Work, a part of the United Nations' World Food Program.

The participants worked on soil and water conservation projects from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., leaving them time for work on their own farms in the afternoons and evenings. They were paid in corn, beans and vegetable oil, and made those foods a bigger part of their diets. "Suddenly they weren't dependent upon growing crops for their own food," Deaton says. "That freed them to shift their farm production from corn to millet and sorghum, which brought a higher price in the market and increased their income."

Farm families were asked at the beginning of the project whether they would rather be paid in food or cash. "Almost all of them preferred cash," Deaton says with a laugh. "But our research revealed that an equivalent value of food commodities was significantly better for them nutritionally."

Participants boosted their calorie consumption by 26 percent and their protein consumption by 16 percent, he says. Non-participants, on the other hand, used more of their cash wages for leisure activities.

Deaton acknowledges that many Americans express shock at the idea of working for food. "It's hard for us to relate to this," he says. "We can't imagine an ecological system that barely lets people survive. But that's precisely what you have in many communities in sub-Saharan Africa.

"Farmers over there jumped at the opportunity to participate in this program. When you're that close to starvation but still reasonably healthy, you're happy to work for food."

### New freshman residence policy designed to boost success rate

In an effort to enhance undergraduate education, MU will require all first-time college students to live in campus residence halls or houses operated by fraternities or sororities beginning in the fall 1994 semester.

"The new policy is designed to enhance first-year students' opportunity for success at MU, and they are more likely to succeed if they live on campus," says Chancellor Charles Kiesler. "I believe this is an important step in our overall goal of improving undergraduate education at MU. We want to ensure that freshmen are in an environment that is conducive to learning and to the development of social and intellectual skills."

The new housing requirement for all first-time college students will apply to those entering MU beginning in the fall of 1994. The current housing policy will not change until that time, says Roger Fisher, director of Residential Life. "The new policy does not impact students entering MU in the fall of 1993. It will affect first-time college students who are younger than 20 as of Aug. 15 of each academic year after the 1993-94 academic year," Fisher says.

Under the new policy, students not classified as first-time college students will be permitted to reside in housing of their choice. Requests for exceptions to the new policy

will be reviewed by the director of Residential Life. The current policy strongly encourages first-time students to live in campus residence halls or houses run by fraternities and sororities that are recognized as student organizations by MU.

A first-time college student is defined as a student who graduated from high school the previous spring and enrolls at MU for the fall semester, or a student who enrolls at the University for the first time and has never attended another college or university.

MU's retention rate of 81 percent for first-time college students is the highest in the Big Eight. Fisher says 85 percent of the

first-time college students living in a residence hall return to MU for a second year. Seventy percent of students who live off-campus return for a second year.

At MU, 4,100 students live in residence halls, and 3,000 students reside in Greek houses. Ninety percent of all first-time freshmen who enter MU choose one of these housing options.

The new policy reflects an effort to fulfill Kiesler's goal of improving retention and graduation rates among undergraduates. Currently, about 52 percent of freshmen graduate within five years, and Kiesler hopes to increase that rate to 65 percent during the next five years.

Kiesler's goal of providing high-quality undergraduate education will be achieved by offering increased opportunities for undergraduate academic advising, increasing residence hall staffing, accelerating the pace of classroom renovations, and possibly establishing one residence hall for freshmen only.

#### Three-year degree programs suggested

The University may explore the possibility of offering three-year baccalaureate degree programs in some areas, the Council of Deans was told Ian. 15

Deans was told Jan. 15.

"In order to complete such a program, students would need to test out of some classes and most likely would have to attend summer school," Provost Gerald Brouder said. "But we believe the idea has merit, and would especially appeal to our brightest high school students — the ones who attend the Missouri Scholars Academy here every summer, for example."

A number of deans, including Lester Bryant, medicine, and Timothy Heinsz, law, said the idea sounded fine. Roger Mitchell, dean of agriculture, food and natural resources, said he had discussed the matter in the past with local public school officials, who seemed favorable. "Let's say that a top Columbia student had indicated an interest toward Harvard," Mitchell said. "A program like this could sway him or her to attend MU for the bachelor's degree, then go on to Harvard for the master's."

Brouder said the idea surfaced during a conversation with Chancellor Charles A. Kiesler. "It would enable us to break out of our traditional mode and take the lead on an important matter," Brouder told the deans. "It wouldn't work in all disciplines, and we

minded the group that final exams are to be given at the times posted in the official class schedule, and not before. A final exam time "agreeable to all" may be held in classes numbered 400 and above, but any other exceptions require the approval of the dean,

In other news, the deans discussed two somewhat related topics: final exams and major field assessment testing. Brouder rethe department head and the registrar. "I plan to issue a reminder to all faculty on this topic," Brouder said.

The provost also noted that students must pass some form of assessment testing in their major field before graduation. Deans pointed

out that the testing can take various forms, from capstone courses to exams to essays. "We use portfolios," added Dean Mills, dean of journalism.

Regardless, Brouder said some students are not taking assessment seriously. "We're doing this for the benefit of the student and the institution — not just because it's a new requirement," he added. "We'll continue to monitor this; we need to do better at it."

On other topics, the deans:

a large undergraduate commencement ceremony the morning of Saturday, May 15, at the Hearnes Center. That is a change from the previously announced date of May 16. Schools and colleges are welcome to have their own convocations after the large ceremony, Brouder said. "Large ceremonies are more than a tradition — they're an exclamation point, calling attention to our principal reason for being," he added.

#### Charge approved for tenure task force

The Faculty Council took another step Jan. 21 toward establishing a task force on tenure.

The council approved an eight-point charge that asks the group to examine and make recommendations on:

- faculty positions that require the protection of academic freedom;
- the scholarship necessary for the awarding of tenure;
- the need for other faculty positions that do not require the protection of academic freedom but should be constituted as continuous appointments;
- the role and definition of non-regular faculty in the mission of the University:
- the concept of an extended period of probation for reasons of dependent care or self-care in the case of illness or injury;
- the length of the probationary period for tenure:
- dealing with cases of impairment of tenured faculty; and
- termination of the policy on mandatory retirement for tenured faculty at age 70.

"We need to take a look at this," said council Chairman Ed Hunvald, professor of law. "Tenure has been unreasonably under attack by some forces in society in recent years. If changes are to be made in the system, we want faculty to take the lead, rather than have those changes forced upon us."

The task force will be composed of 21 faculty members, and nominations are coming in from the divisions now, Hunvald said. The council will appoint a chairman or chair-





#### An important MU energy-saver

Over the past two years, the campus lighting program has saved MU \$250,000. A major

reason for the program's success is **Don Love**, an electrician with Energy Management.

The mission of Don's work group is to save money by saving energy on campus.

"Don believes in what we're doing," says Energy Engineer Sam Thornton. "He's very interested in how much money we're saving MU."

One of the group's projects is to install energy-efficient ballasts in fluorescent light fixtures. In addition to consuming less en-

ergy, the new ballasts create less heat, which reduces air conditioning costs.

"Last year we didn't have enough hours in the day to install new ballasts at the General Classroom Building due to the heavy class schedule," says Sam, "so Don volunteered to work at

night. Because he's so flexible we made a lot of progress."

When confronted with a problem, "Don has lots of good ideas," says Sam. For example, Don figured out a way to use motion sensors to dim lights without turning them all the way off, a necessary feature where low light is critical for safety.

"Don is conscientious about quality. He wants people to see good work," says Sam.







#### 33 drop points established for recycling phone books

Recycling of GTE phone books will be easy this year. The MU recycling committee and building coordinators have identified specific drop points in or near 33 University buildings where dark gray city recycling containers will be placed on Jan. 29.

When the new phone books are delivered the first week of February, employees are urged to place their old phone books in the containers. There is no need to remove the covers or any inserts. The containers will be in place through Feb. 12.

The efforts of the city and GTE have been tremendous," says Mary Sapp, assistant director of Business Services for the UM System and chairwoman of the phone book recycling subcommittee. The city is working with the University and Columbia public schools by providing the containers and picking up the books. GTE will then arrange to ship the directories, using the Columbia Area Truck School, to Ft. Howard Paper Co. in Oklahoma, where the books will be made into shop rags.

This has become a citywide project," says Sapp, noting that participants and sponsors include Boone County banks, the Sierra Club, KFC restaurants, Nowell's, Civic Recycling, and KCLR, KCMQ and KTGR ra-

Old MU phone books may also be recycled, but the committee asks that no other paper items, such as newspapers or magazines, be placed in the bins. "The books need to be kept dry, so please keep the lids down," Sapp says. "The University will receive 16,100 phone books this year, which amounts to 36,000 pounds that could be diverted from

the landfill. We hope everyone will pitch in."
