Teaming up for a better Mizzou

THE THEME FOR STAFF RECOGNITION WEEK says it all: Better Through Teamwork.

"Staff are a very important part of the Mizzou team, and this is their week to be recognized," says Donna Taylor-Stearns, chairwoman of MU's Staff Advisory Council. The week-long celebration is packed with special events that honor the contributions staff members make every day.

Kicking off the festivities is the Staff Recognition Awards ceremony at 1:30 p.m. April 15 in Jesse Auditorium. Chancellor Charles Kiesler will present awards to a staff member from each of the four job classifications. The Mick Deaver Memorial Award recognizes a staff member for fostering good relations with students. The Barbara Uehling Award for Administrative Excellence honors an administrator who has contributed to improved working conditions and quality of life for MU staff. Long-time employees also will be honored for their years of service.

Some staff work in highly visible positions, others work behind the scenes, but all their efforts combine to help keep MU at the forefront of public research universities. "We encourage everyone to come out and enjoy as many of the events as they can. The Staff Council looks forward to this week every year," says Taylor-Stearns, administrative associate I in the Department of Pharmacology.

This year the events include old favorites — like the fashion show and variety show — with new ones mixed in for good measure. New events include a tour of the Research Reactor and an open house at Campus Computing.

All the events are put together by Staff Council members and volunteers. The variety show is one of the biggest crowd pleasers and it's a good example of how staff from across campus pitch in.

The Kress Study Collection

committed to the preservation of European works of art and contributes to academic institutions that have the same desire. Shapley felt that MU met this criteria.

Kress' largest gift was 1,800 works to the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. This was a substantial gift to the museum that had only 450 pieces at its opening in 1941. He then wanted to distribute his art across the country. The foundation has given the gift of art to 96 museums, universities and other institutions across America.

Among the paintings in MU's Kress Study Collection are *Head of a Young Woman* by Pietro Rotario; *The Sacrifice of Isaac* by the Dutch School, Imitator of Rembrandt; *Temptation of St. Anthony* by Bartolommeo Montagna and *Athena Scorning the Advances of Hephaestus* by Paris Bordone. All but one of the 14 paintings are in an ongoing display in Pickard Hall. They were first examined and cleaned by Jenny Sherman, a painting conservator from New York. One painting, *A Saint King* by Bernardino Fungai, was sent to New York for extensive treatment.

"One of the stipulations of the gift was that we care, house and display the paintings in accordance to museum standards," says Christine Neal, curator of European and American art at the museum.

To celebrate the anniversary of the Kress Foundation gift, the museum is sponsoring a symposium at 1 p.m. April 14 in Pickard Hall. During the symposium, Edgar Peter Bowron, senior curator of paintings at the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C., will discuss the "Gift to America." At 3 p.m., a panel of scholars will discuss their research on the paintings, including one researcher's finding that the name of one of the paintings has changed. The symposium is free and open to the public.

The gift of art

Museum symposium celebrates the 35th anniversary of the Kress Study Collection

This year marks the 35th anniversary of the "Great Kress Art Giveaway" and of the beginning of MU's Museum of Art and Archaeology. The museum got its start with a gift of 14 old master paintings from the Kress Foundation giveaway in 1961.

The foundation was started by Samuel H. Kress, one of the wealthiest men in America. He gained his success through retailing with a chain of 5-and-10-cent shops scattered throughout the South. In the 1920s, during his travels in Europe he developed a love for art and set out to obtain works by every known Italian master. Even stronger than his desire for collecting was his desire to promote education through art. In 1929, he started a foundation to make his collection permanently accessible to the public.

MU was chosen to receive part of Samuel H. Kress' collection of more than 3,000 old master paintings, sculptures and decorative art by a devoted alumnae. Fern Rusk Shapley graduated in 1916 with a doctorate in art history and archaeology, and in 1961 she was curator of the Kress Foundation. The foundation is

AN AGENDA TO FIGHT POVERTY

What role can our government play

in alleviating poverty? Noted labor economist Rebecca Blank will address that question at a seminar held at 3:45 p.m. tomorrow in 310 Middlebush Hall. Blank, professor of economics at Northwestern University, will present "It Takes A Nation: A New Agenda for Fighting Poverty." That also is the title of her recently completed book which looks at the labor market and how the nation's less affluent populations have fared over the last decade. Her talk will focus on a chapter from the book which examines the role of "targeted programs" such as the earned income credit, job and child-care programs, and the possibility of

these programs solving the problems of poverty. A copy of the chapter is available before the seminar in the Department of Economics office, 118 Professional Building.

GOING ONLINE FOR COLLEGE SAVINGS

Rob Weagley is used to fielding questions from students in his classes, but next week the associate professor of consumer and family economics faces a nationwide audience of questioners. Weagley will take part in a live online conference at 8 p.m. April 17 to answer questions about

college savings options.

Weagley, a financial planning expert, was interviewed on the topic for a special section in the April issue of *Money* magazine. That publication then arranged the nationwide question-and-answer session to be conducted over Compuserve, a commercial provider of online services.

So what's the most often asked question about college savings plans? "Probably the biggest question is 'Should I save money in my name or my child's name?'" Weagley says. "Another question many parents have is 'How much do I save and where do I save it?'"




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MU's staff is the "dream team." This year's award winners are clockwise from the top Scott Keith, Kathy Basnett, Howard Kincaid and John Burks.

Scott Keith Technical/Paraprofessional

First impressions are lasting, and Scott Keith has had much to do with making MU the pride of the state, esthetically.

A landscape gardener, Keith supervises fewer than 10 employees responsible for completing more than 75 landscape projects a year, on time, to exacting horticultural specifications and, if possible, under budget.

Keith consistently performs well beyond the expectations of management and his peers, and he continues to strive for excellence in all of his work, says his supervisor, Charles Paxton.

Keith's work ethic is simple. "I tell the guys I want, and will not sacrifice, quality, even when jobs need to be done quickly," he says.

Some of his crew's handiwork can be seen at Turner Avenue Garage, Reynolds Alumni and Visitor Center, Lee Hills Hall, and last week they started the dirt rolling around the Maryland Avenue parking structure.

Paxton says Keith is an exceptional employee for another reason: His knowledge of science and horticulture, and his landscaping experience is self-taught. Starting at MU in 1983 as a custodian, he moved up through the ranks to grounds keeper, to one of two arborists on campus and to landscape gardener, a technical position normally held by someone with a degree in horticulture and a minimum of four years' supervisory experience.

"I've studied hard on my own," Keith says, "and I've learned so much from everyone I've worked with. They've helped make my job enjoyable, especially my supervisor." And for Keith nothing is more enjoyable than turning a barren piece of land into a thing of beauty with trees, bushes and shrubs. "It's pleasing to see the final product," he says with a smile.

Kathy Basnett Secretarial/Clerical

Students, faculty and staff familiar with the General Classroom Building know that Kathy Basnett is the person who holds the fourth floor together.

Senior Secretary Basnett reinforced this truth when, for nearly three months, she was "acting chairwoman" of philosophy and pretty much ran the department single handedly. She had no choice — sudden back surgery put her boss and chairman of the department out of commission last summer.

"Mrs. Basnett was able to keep a very diverse and extremely demanding faculty not only satisfied, but also pleased with her suggestions and work," says now recovered Chairman Joseph Bien.


Basnett started working at MU 16 years ago in the economics department. She moved to physical medicine and rehabilitation, and then to family and community medicine. For the past five years she's been the only support staff for philosophy's 10 faculty members, 15 teaching assistants, 60 undergraduate majors and 40 graduate students.

Departmental staff say she gets everything done and done right, in a minimum amount of time. "She is by far the best secretary our department has ever had," says a philosophy faculty member.

"My department comes first," Basnett says. "Whatever it takes to keep the department running is what I'll do." She credits an innate sense of time management for her ability to complete her tasks in normal work hours. "I never had to take a course in time management, it's just there," she says. "There are certain things I have to do, and somehow I get them all done, even with constant interruptions," says Basnett who recently has returned to work after also undergoing back surgery.

Staff Recognition Awards

Better through teamwork



Howard Kincaid Administrative/Professional

An old business maxim says that a sure sign of a good manager is the people who work with him. That description fits Howard Kincaid to a T.

At University Hospitals and Clinics, Kincaid has many staff members who have been at MU 20 years and more. Some have even worked for him their entire University careers. Kincaid is the hospital's director of Marketing, Development and Human Resources.

Colleagues say that Kincaid has mastered the art of listening — staff are comfortable approaching him with new ideas and difficult situations. "His endless knowledge of the University and its systems allows him to look at all sides of the situation to get things moving in the right direction," says a co-worker. "In other words, he can be tender and tough at the same time."

"I think people innately want to do a good job," Kincaid says. "Often, it's just a matter of being open and honest with people. You have to have a genuine interest in people, they can tell when you don't."

For Kincaid, his interest in people has been more than repaid. "I like to look at the successes that people who worked with me or for me have had," he says. "It always makes you feel good to think you've somehow contributed to others' success."

There have been more than a few challenges along the way. He built the hospital's development department from scratch. Many years ago, Kincaid was given the task of putting together the first Children's Miracle Network telethon in mid-Missouri in just a few months. Since then, the event has grown into a department of its own, has raised more than \$1 million and has been embraced by MU and Columbia-area families. More recently, he was named to coordinate the merger of Mount Vernon Rehabilitation Center with University Hospitals and Clinics.

People from all levels of the organization respect and admire Kincaid as a talented leader and a people person. "Howard Kincaid will be found at many events and activities with his sleeves rolled up working side by side with staff," says a co-worker. "He realizes firsthand that it takes the whole team to make things successful."

John Burks Crafts/Maintenance

When Tiger fans stream into Memorial Stadium on football Saturdays, John Burks has already been on the scene for hours. In fact Burks, supervisor of athletic maintenance, and his crew are the first ones there and the last ones to leave at the end of the day. He hasn't missed a home game since 1975.

But football isn't his only focus. Burks and his staff do the preparation and cleanup for all outdoor sports at MU and are responsible for equipment repair and maintenance. In addition to Memorial Stadium, he oversees the fertilizing, mowing and marking of the grass playing fields and attends to a thousand other details. It can be a dawn-to-dusk job in all kinds of weather.

Co-workers say that Burks is dependable and always prepared, and that attitude shows. "I'd rather be an hour early than five minutes late," Burks says. One of his biggest challenges came last year, when the athletic department installed a new state-of-the-art grass playing surface on Faurot Field. It was a big enough job in itself, but the weather — to put it mildly — didn't cooperate. Torrential rains were followed by a heat wave, but Burks and his crew still had the field ready for play opening night.

Each year, he logs many extra hours helping the city of Columbia and the state high school athletic association with events in Memorial Stadium and Simmons Field.

"John Burks has been one of the University's hardest working employees for the last 28 years," says his supervisor, Mark Fitzpatrick. "Although he works behind the scenes, no one can take more pride than he for a smooth-running event. Many others receive compliments for work for which John is responsible, but he does not seek the limelight."

Burks takes all the challenges in stride. "I figure the good Lord gave me this job," he says. "I've tried to take care of it the best I can."



Nancy Jones Uehling Award

The Barbara S. Uehling Award for Administrative Excellence was established in 1986 to honor an administrator who has demonstrated qualities of leadership, administrative excellence and has contributed in some way to improve the working conditions and the quality of life for MU staff. Uehling was MU chancellor from 1978-86 and established the Staff Advisory Council.

important, she knows and calls everyone by their first name when she sees them, without having to look at their name badge.

Jones regularly commends her staff for jobs well done, whether through written or verbal communication, or through recommending them for some of the recognition programs the hospital offers. "Although I always try to convey how important the staff is to our operation, I know there is so much more I could and should be doing."

Managing made easy

This year's theme for Staff Recognition Week, "Better Through Teamwork," fits Nancy Jones like a glove. Part of her responsibilities as manager of medicine services at University Hospital includes supervising 100 nurses, unit clerks and unit attendants who are employed on 4 West [an inpatient unit] and in the Short Stay Center.

Jones, a 20-year employee, started out as a registered nurse, then moved to staff education, and for almost 11 years she has served in the current management post.

The entire hospital respects Jones as an outstanding leader, colleagues say. "At University Hospital, we have an award called excellence in management," says a co-worker. "Nancy received it so many times that the hospital officially 'retired' her as an annual contender for this award."

Other co-workers say Jones has an incredible ability to help staff members recognize their goal and mission as nurses and health-care providers, and she is able to keep morale and staff motivation at an incredibly high level at all times. They ascribe these accomplishments to her management style of allowing staff members to participate in decision making. "Many managers say they involve staff, yet it is not always the case," a colleague says. "Nancy is a leader who always directs with staff input and guidance. She creates an environment in which people feel truly empowered and motivated to get the job done." This occurs because Jones constantly listens to the employees, strives to create an excellent working environment and promotes teamwork and pride in the University.

"I have an excellent staff," Jones says. "I do nothing by myself; it's all through the team of people that I supervise." Despite her hectic schedule of running the department, Jones finds time to bake homemade dishes for award presentations or for birthdays. Every Christmas, she makes a homemade gift for each of the staff members in her unit; and more

Through a student's eyes

Rebecca O'Neal tries to see the University through a student's eyes. That way she's able to make her own small corner of campus as comfortable as possible for students.

As administrative assistant in the Department of Textile and Apparel Management, she coordinates all the department's academic, fiscal and support functions. But the welfare of students is always a main focus. "I'm here to help; it's part of my job," O'Neal says.

Her co-workers say she takes it far beyond the routine. They say O'Neal's spirit of helpfulness sets her apart. Students can come to her on the verge of tears — because of academic problems, a health crisis, even a broken-down car — and they know they'll get a kind word and good advice from O'Neal.

"All the students in our department see Becky as a kind, helpful, supportive individual," says Kitty Dickerson, textile and apparel management chairwoman. "They know that they will never be treated abruptly or rudely, and that she will go the extra mile necessary to aid in whatever problem or issue they bring to her attention. She is gracious and helpful beyond words."

Other faculty say O'Neal is a master of tact and a brilliant combination of wisdom and savvy. "She helps each person as if his or her problem is the most important issue in her life at that moment," says another colleague.

"I know students would like to have a place they can come to and feel comfortable," O'Neal says. "It's hard being a college student. Especially for freshmen it's a real struggle, being away from mom and dad, learning to be themselves."

For O'Neal, all that caring comes natural. In addition to her six brothers and sisters, O'Neal's parents also took care of as many as five foster children at one time. "It's easy for me to share," O'Neal says. "I like being around people, I like seeing them grow because that was my environment when I was growing up."



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

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
