A new focus on enhancement

Plan requests \$6 million to strengthen Mizzou's missions.

The Board of Curators approved a mission enhancement plan Sept. 26 for the UM System that requests \$20.65 million in first-year funding to improve undergraduate education, expand research and support collaborative programs.

The plan will be forwarded to the state Coordinating Board for Higher Education, which will consider the request at an Oct. 8 meeting. Virtually all other state colleges and universities have gone through the mission enhancement process already. Taken together, those institutions averaged a 14 percent increase in funding through the enhancement process.

Each year for the next four years, the University will have the opportunity to request new funding from the legislature for special programs. Higher priority items were selected for first-year funding.

Mizzou's mission enhancement plan requests first-year funding of \$6 million, including \$4 million for interdisciplinary programs in the life sciences and \$2 million for connections among graduate programs, research and the undergraduate experience.

A \$7.65 million joint request from the UM System includes \$4 million for the endowed chairs program, \$1.5 million for libraries and library technology, \$1.9 million for cooperative programs and \$250,000 for faculty internships.

"We realize that our mission enhancement request is large, but so is the University of Missouri, and so are its various missions and obligations to this state," said UM System President Manuel Pacheco.

"As the state's only public research university it carries special burdens. With proper support, the public

research university can offer its students — undergraduate and graduate — extraordinary opportunities unavailable in any other college or university."

Pacheco noted that during the planning process, former interim President Mel George left open the option of reducing the original mission enhancement request.

"I studied the issues and discussed them thoroughly with the general officers and determined that every element in our presentation has merit and promise," Pacheco said. "I am in complete agreement with the first-year requests resulting from the process that preceded my arrival."

He said he would work with the board and others over the next year to "extend our strategic planning and to refine our request for the remaining three years of our mission enhancement cycle."

Because of the success of the recently completed five-year financial plan, the University "put its financial house in order on its own terms," Pacheco said. "The University of Missouri is in a healthy condition, physically, academically and financially."

Remembering the 'Law Barn'

MU's School of Law celebrates 125th year of legal education.

With its elegant, prize-winning architecture, the School of Law's Hulston Hall hardly can be described as a barn. For more than a quarter century, though, law students affectionately referred to their home in what is now the Sociology Building as

the Law Barn. That was the law school's second home; it moved there in 1893 after fire destroyed Academic Hall.

Last weekend, during MU's annual Law Day celebration, nearly 600 past and present law students gathered to help celebrate the school's 125th anniversary. Gov. Mel Carnahan, a 1959 law alumnus, gave the keynote address at the Sept. 26 banquet. Carnahan's ties to the school are deep. Not only is he a graduate, but so are his sons Randy, Russ and Tom, and his daughter-in-law Debra.

Carnahan is one of four Missouri governors to graduate from the School of Law. In addition, 16 Missouri Supreme Court justices — including 13 chief justices — 62 Missouri legislators, 21

members of Congress and 21 Missouri Bar presidents have been Mizzou law alumni.

Those who attended the weekend celebration had a lot to talk about. There were favorite professors to recall. William "The Fox" Pittman, for example, who could write behind his back on a blackboard without ever once taking his eyes off the class. Or Lee-Carl Overstreet, who was known as "The Bull" for his ability to intimidate unprepared students. And there was the 50-year reign of terror from a massive wasp colony that once inhabited Tate Hall.

It was at the old Law Barn, though, where the rivalry between law and engineering students took root. No one's quite sure how it all started. One theory is that the lawyers took exception to the engineers' heavy-handed use of paddles to protect the Quad, which engineers considered their bailiwick. Over the years the feud resulted in more than a few pranks and, on occasion, an outright brawl or two.

The lawyers, however, had a guardian angel. From the window of her Law Barn office, Miss Alice Benson, the dean's secretary, kept an eye out for intruding engineers and launched ink pots at any who got into range.

Some traditions fell by the wayside over the years. The long-standing feud with the engineers appears to be patched up. And in the early 1970s, law students voted to end the practice of standing when professors entered the classroom to begin a lecture.

Other traditions are still going strong, says Ed Hunvald, professor of law, who started teaching here in 1957. One time-honored practice, Hunvald says, is the "clapping gauntlet." Students stand and clap a professor out of the room on the final day of class each year. And when a professor retires, students and faculty line the hallway after the final class to clap the honored lecturer on a final professorial walk.

Then there's the bust of Lee Harry Tate. A 1913 law graduate, Tate's parents donated half the money to build Tate Hall in their son's memory. For years, law students have dressed the statue in seasonal garb — Tate might wear a Santa cap at Christmas time, or as the Barristers Ball approaches he might suddenly be sporting a top hat. Last weekend, the bust was decked out in a black-and-gold Tiger athletic jacket and cap.

When the law school moved into Hulston Hall in 1988, Tate went along in more than spirit. How did the bust find its way to the law school's new digs? Did tradition-bound law students spirit it away in the dead of night? Or were there protracted negotiations, with exchanges of legal briefs, writs and discovery documents?

Hunvald explains in true understated, lawyerly fashion: "It just turned up here one day. Let's put it that way."

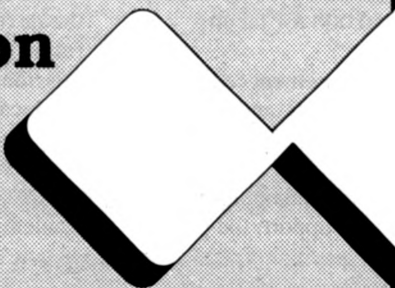
FAMILY TIES TO MU

"Thus, as the University takes its turn at refining its missions and strengthening them, it does so with the confidence that any new investment in the institution will pay for improved undergraduate education, for expanded and improved research, and for greater cooperation and collaboration with other organizations.

Pacheco also reported to the board on external funding results for the fiscal year that ended June 30. For the UM System, gifts, grants and contracts rose more than 15.8 percent in one year. Private gifts increased by 40 percent in one year — from \$53.47 million in fiscal 1996 to \$75 million last year.

During that same period, grants and contracts increased by nearly \$10 million to \$156.6 million. Of that amount, \$73.3 million was used for research throughout the UM System.

"I applaud those who are responsible for this result, but in my experience, when contracts and grants for research fall short of private gifts to a major public research

university, something is out of balance," Pacheco said.

"As I become better acquainted with our campuses and our researchers, I become more impressed with our research achievements and potential. I have seen centers of excellence that are attracting federal support in an exceedingly competitive environment. That success must be multiplied and expanded, however, if we are to take our place among the foremost public research universities in the nation."

Over the past fiscal year, Mizzou increased its private giving by \$8.66 million to just under \$34 million, a 31 percent increase in one year. Total grants and contracts at MU went up by more than \$2 million to \$86.34 million.

Interim Chancellor Richard Wallace noted that grants and contracts for research at MU had increased in that one year from nearly \$46 million to \$51 million. "That was just about the increase we had managed in the three previous years combined," Wallace said. "If we can stay on that path we're in good shape."

Say shoo to the flu. University Hospital and Clinics is making it a little easier to avoid getting sick this winter. The hospital will offer drive-in flu immunizations from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Oct. 11 for anyone over age 13.

The immunizations are designed to be quick and easy. Attendees will not be required to get out of their cars, but are asked to wear clothing with loose sleeves. Shots will cost \$5 for the general public, but are free to patients of University Physicians primary-care doctors, individuals over age 65 and those with high-risk medical conditions. University Physicians primary-care patients should bring their HMO or point-of-service cards.

In the event of rain, the flu shots will be offered at the Health Information Center in Columbia Mall. The Health Information Center also will offer flu shots from 9 a.m. to noon and 3 to 6 p.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays from Oct. 15 to Nov. 25.
