## Making their move

**CAMPUS SHOWPLACE**

The College of Business begins moving into its new digs in Cornell Hall May 20

**T**here are still more than a few finishing touches before Cornell Hall opens for business as the new home of the College of Business. Earlier this week, room numbers were still written on sheets of paper taped to doorways. Workers were uncrating furniture and hooking up the extensive new computer network.

But as the excitement of commencement weekend dies away, business faculty and staff will be getting ready to make the big move beginning May 20. Professor will teach classes in Cornell Hall during the summer session that begins June 11. The formal dedication ceremony will take place Sept. 7.

The building is 150,000 square feet — twice the size of the college's current location in Middlebush Hall. The additional space will allow the college to consolidate operations and departments that currently are

spread around campus.

Cornell Hall has five and one-half floors built around a central atrium. It has 16 technology rich classrooms, two computer classrooms, a student computer lab, a 125-seat lecture hall and a 500-seat auditorium.

The \$30 million building is named for Harry Cornell, a 1950 MU business graduate and his wife Ann. The Cornells made the lead \$3.5 million gift for the building and for an endowed professorship in information systems.

The new campus showplace had its genesis more than a decade ago, shortly after Dean Bruce Walker arrived on campus. Walker says at first he was convinced that brick-and-mortar projects weren't as important for the college as high-quality students, a demanding curriculum and dedicated faculty.

After six months at Middlebush Hall, "I realized we needed a new building," Walker says. "Cornell Hall is not an end in itself, but a means of providing our students with an even better education."

Walker and the college have even more good news to celebrate. On May 3, MU received a \$10 million gift from MU alumnus Gordon Crosby Jr. and his wife Chessie that will enable the College of Business to provide a higher quality education to its MBA students and, in turn, raise the national stature of its MBA program.

Crosby's donation, the largest gift to an MU academic division from a living donor, is dedicated to the college's top strategic priority, which is to strengthen its degree programs, particularly the MBA program. In recognition of Crosby's donation, the program will be renamed the Gordon E. Crosby Jr. MBA Program.

Crosby, of Fort Myers, Fla., is a former chairman of the board at USLIFE Corp., an innovator in the life insurance industry.

## Mizzou staff are 'United and Strong'

**RECOGNIZING STAFF CONTRIBUTIONS**

A week of special activities for MU staff begins May 20

**C**lassrooms must be cleaned. Meals have to be prepared. Grass has to be mowed. Multitudes of forms have to be completed. Tons of materials have to be typed, copied and distributed. Employees must be paid

These are some of the duties performed by more than 8,000 rank-and-file staff members around campus. Mizzou will honor their contributions May 20 to 24 during the 23rd annual Staff Recognition Week.

Sponsored by the Staff Advisory Council, the weeklong

celebration "is an opportunity for each of us to reflect and take pride in the fact that staff is a vital and important part of the operation of this institution and in making Mizzou the very best it can be," says Gail Lawrence, council chair and an administrative assistant in anthropology.

With the theme, "MU Staff United and Strong," the week's events take on a patriotic flavor. "The days, weeks and months that have followed 9/11 has shown that a nation and its people remaining united and strong can make it through adversity," Lawrence says.

The same concept can be applied to the University's current budget crisis, says Daffany Hood, a council member and an administrative assistant in art history and

archaeology. "As never before, the staff needs to pull together to keep the mission of MU moving forward," she says. "We must also be strong and united to make sure that staff do not bear the major burden of the funding crises."

The highlight of the week is the awards ceremony at 1:30 p.m. May 20 in Jesse Auditorium. Chancellor Richard Wallace will present four \$2,000 Chancellor's Outstanding Staff awards to a winner selected from each job category.

In addition, two other awards in the amount of \$1,000 each will be presented. The Mick Deaver Memorial Award honors a staff member who fosters good relationships with students. The Barbara S. Uehling Award of Administrative Excellence recognizes an MU administrator

for leadership qualities and for contributing to improved working conditions for staff.

Throughout the week, there will be opportunities to attend a mixture of events such as the ever popular variety show, sponsored tours and motivational speeches delivered by famed basketball coach Charles Spoonhour. After the former coach at St. Louis University retired, he toured the country as a lecturer. Now, he's returned to the hardwoods at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas but lectures in the off-season.

Spoonhour comes to campus May 21. "With the budget crisis facing the campus, a need to pump up the morale of staff is essential," Hood says. "Although a talk by Mr. Spoonhour will not cure our budget woes, it can help us as individuals focus on what is important."

Spoonhour will deliver his

speech "Isn't Life Wonderful" at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. in Jesse Auditorium. "Mr. Spoonhour is funny, entertaining and a wonderful motivator," Lawrence says. "We scheduled his speeches to allow for office coverage while affording everyone the opportunity to attend."

The mini tours, "Discovering MU" scheduled for May 22, 23 and 24, focus on the treasures found in the museums and the library.

Mum's the word on the finale for the variety show May 23, but it is "guaranteed to leave you laughing," Lawrence says. "We ask all supervisors to encourage their staff members to join us for a week of acknowledging a job well done."

**Construction will close some campus streets**

**ROAD WARRIORS**

Providence Road overpass gets under way this summer

**A** number of upcoming construction projects means that several campus roadways will be closed during the summer months.

- Installation of underground utilities on Fifth Street, and on Turner and Conley avenues will require several street closings: Fifth Street will be closed in phases from May 21 to July 19 from Rollins Street to Turner Avenue and east on Turner to Maryland Avenue. Fifth Street will be closed from July 22 to

Aug. 30 from Turner Avenue north to Conley and east on Conley to Sixth Street. Fifth Street will be closed from Sept. 2 to Sept. 20 from Conley Avenue north to the west entrance of Conley Avenue garage.

- A utility crossing will be installed for the Life Sciences Center, and Rollins Street will be closed near the intersection of Virginia Avenue from May 21 to June 7 for installation of underground utilities. Traffic will be rerouted via nearby streets.

- The resurfacing of Carrie Franke Drive will require it to be closed in phases from June 3 to Sept. 1 from the intersection of

Research Park Drive north to the RP-6 Parking Lot entrance. The first phase begins at the Research Park Drive intersection, which will close June 3 and is scheduled to reopen June 24.

- The resurfacing of Cramer Service Drive will require Hitt Street to be closed in mid to late June for two weeks from Hospital Drive to the north edge of the Ambulatory Care Building.

- Construction on the Providence Road pedestrian overpass will require Providence Road to be closed to set trusses for approximately four hours in late June or early July at a date


yet to be determined. The overpass will span Providence Road from the Memorial Stadium parking area to an area near the Taylor Building. The trusses will be set after midnight in order to minimize traffic interference and traffic will be rerouted. The overpass is scheduled to open about mid-August.

Other summer activity includes: the June 1 reopening of Fifth Street between Stewart Road and Elm Street, routine resurfacing of several parking lots, installation of a new storm drain immediately north of Neff Hall, and the repair and

refurbishment of the low-water crossing over Hinkson Creek in the Hinkson Creek Recreation Area.

In addition, two new parking lots will be created. One lot containing 126 parking spaces will be adjacent to the southeast side of Virginia Avenue Parking Garage. The other lot will contain nearly 350 spaces and will be built east of and bordering HSC2S and HSC4, presently used by University Hospital and Clinics personnel. Both are due to be completed Aug. 15.

Also scheduled for completion by Aug. 15 is a new storm drain running between Eighth and Ninth streets that will be installed between the north end of Neff Annex and Elm Street.

## Wireless Networking 128-Bit Upgrade Set for May 19

In an effort to enhance security on the wireless network, Mizzou TigerNet Wireless, IAT Services will upgrade the network from 40-bit to 128-bit encryption on Sunday, May 19. Upgrading to 128-bit encryption provides the highest level of protection possible for all Internet communications.

This upgrade requires wireless networking users to obtain a new Wired Equivalent Privacy (WEP) key and possess a wireless Network Interface Card (NIC) that supports 128-bit encryption to be able to continue to access the network.



**K**aren Ballew gives more than a white-glove inspection in MU's scientific labs.

She leads a team of three who inspect 850 laboratories, shops, farms and other sites where hazardous materials are present. They check to see if the employees are complying with federal regulations. Typically these visits are unannounced

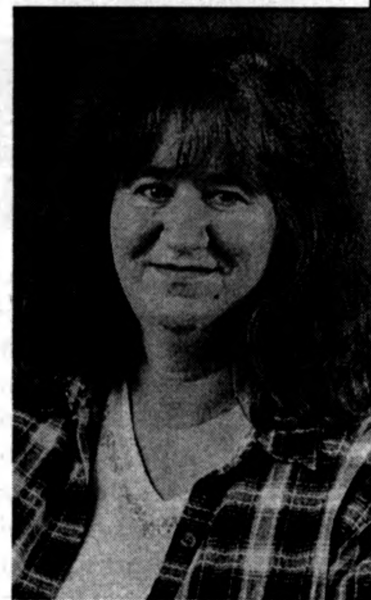
Peers say Ballew brings quality to the job. "She ensures that with every visit, she brings in a smile to make the visit a pleasant one. Our job is difficult because we have to point out the negative, and not too many like to hear that," says a co-worker. "Karen has this ability to make the negative seem not so bad and then she always follows it with compliments about what the people are doing right."

Ballew has worked at MU for almost 10 years. The biggest challenge, she says, comes from working with people from other countries where hazardous materials are not regulated as tightly as in the United States. The variety of her job is what she likes best. "I've met so many people from all walks of life," she says. "This has been a great education."

Ballew is a teacher in her own right. She conducts training classes on hazardous materials. The classes are designed to give a broader picture of the importance of protecting the environment as well as stressing the need for personal safety and health issues that could arise from working without protective clothing from head to toe.

Ballew balances her office workload with managing a household of 125 houseplants, 14 cats, two dogs, two sons and a husband. She is an avid gardener and recently graduated from the Master Gardener's Program sponsored through University Outreach and Extension.

She loves plants and loves to share them. Ballew recalls revisiting a large lab that was vacated abruptly and seeing numerous plants in need of watering. Some time later, she learned the new home of the plants' owners. "It was such a tiny space, at least 12 times smaller than what they had," she says. "They didn't have room for even desks." When they learned that she had taken

care of their plants, they advised her to add them to her personal collection at home. But she went a step farther. "I felt bad that they had to leave their plants," she says. "I had lots of cacti and succulents of my own, so I gathered up a bunch and took them to the lab."

Upon arriving at MU in 1997, Diane Dahlmann's challenges were to improve, upgrade and take Recreation Services to the next level and to participate in seeing that the expansion of Brewer Field House moved forward.

Since then she has become the chief advocate for building at MU the world's finest recreation organization and promoting the benefits of positive leisure experiences among student, faculty, staff and alumni.

This vision is shared and implemented departmentwide and carried out by Team Mizzou, made up of more than 200 student employees, and 14 full-time staff members. The vision has led to improvements in the quality and quantity of services offered to the campus and community. "The bottom line for the department," she says, "is that we want our students and members to feel good about themselves, about Mizzou and about life. I am one lucky woman to get to work with great individuals who are engaged, involved and enthusiastic."

Through reallocating departmental resources, she was able to meet growing student, faculty and staff expectations and demands. As a result, the department has enjoyed numerous financial and strategic successes. Some include: student use of the recreational center increasing from 58 percent in 1998 to 82 percent in 2001, faculty and staff membership incrementally increasing each year for the past four years and a new handbook and Web site enhancing the department's image.

After it became obvious that the recreation facilities enjoyed high usage and that students wanted and were willing to pay for new and better facilities, Dahlmann "rolled up her sleeves and went to work," says a colleague.

Through regular contact with campus constituencies, she played a critical role in the passage of a \$43 million Brewer Expansion and Renovation Project. "This is a dream project of a lifetime," Dahlmann says. "For those of us who have the gift to see places and spaces before they are actual and physical, we can hardly wait until the doors officially open in 2005."

Dahlmann is a divisional

leader in orienting and preparing new professional staff for successful roles within Student Affairs and in encouraging staff to pursue professional development opportunities. "Our most valuable assets are human assets, and to commit to their growth, and personal and professional development pays them and the University dividends."

**W**hen Laura Hacquard started working at the MU Women's Center, she expected to stay for three or four years before moving on. That was more than 19 years ago. "To be honest, I can't imagine doing anything else that would mean as much," says Hacquard, who is now coordinator of the Women's Center.

Her work has made a difference at Mizzou. In 1985 she was a driving force in organizing the Rape Education Center. Several years ago, Hacquard helped found the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender Resource Center.

Hacquard's co-workers praise her leadership and team-building skills. "Laura is respected far and wide by students and her peers. In order to be respected I have found that you must first respect, and I have witnessed nothing but respect and grace from Laura no matter how frustrating the situation," says one colleague.

One co-worker describes Hacquard's leadership style as a "willingness to be in a constant state of discovery." Whether she is working in her role with the Women's Center, with the MU Counseling Center or supervising the Rape Education Center, Hacquard says she tries not to rely on preconceived ideas of people or issues.

"I learn something about myself or what I do or the nature of life all the time," she says. Her co-workers say that Hacquard never asks them to do any task she isn't willing to take on herself. That might mean answering the telephone or making a stack of photocopies.

She says her goal is "creating a supportive, cooperative environment" where people can grow and flourish in their jobs. "Laura is the best boss I have ever had," says one colleague. "She has encouraged and supported autonomy, while staying abreast of every project. She manages her employees with authority that has never seemed authoritarian."

Students see her as a mentor and counselor. "She gives unconditionally," says a former student worker. "Many, many students come back after years away to reflect on how her commitment to them changed their lives."

In her own time away from the workplace, Hacquard

admits to a fondness for "digging in the dirt," reading, and long walks with family pets. "A calm, quiet life," she explains, "to balance my work."

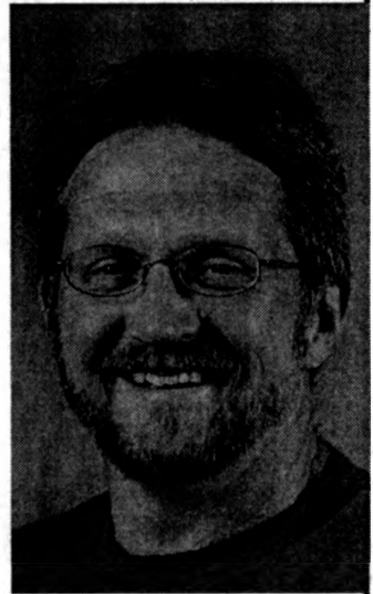

Ask Paul Morris what he likes best about his job here at MU and he doesn't have to think long to come up with an answer. "It's the people," Morris says. As a high-voltage electrician for Energy Management, Morris' job entails installing, repairing and maintaining MU's electrical distribution system. His love of gardening prompted Morris and his wife to enroll in the Master Gardeners Program several years ago. Those who complete the gardening training program are then expected to share their new expertise with the community. Morris volunteered to help out as an instructor with a gardening program at the Boone County Juvenile Justice Center to help guide local youth who are in trouble with the law to a better way of life. "Gardening is my favorite pastime and my best therapy," he says.

His co-workers say that Morris' commitment to others carries over to his work on campus. "Paul lives a life of sound moral judgement," says one colleague. "He is an advocate for what is right, always concerned for the welfare of others, and takes

charge to see that what is right and fair is accomplished."

Whether students stay in school and have a chance to succeed depends on whether they form a personal connection with just one person and whether they find a sense of belonging.

During her 14 years at MU, Kathy Murray has made a difference to thousands of students both directly and indirectly. She does so through comforting and challenging them, listening to someone who is homesick or lonely, celebrating with someone who just got a good grade, or sponsoring a range of social and educational activities for the entire student body.

As an assistant director of Student Life, she has primary supervision of the Student Involvement Center, as well as supervision of Student Legal Services, the MSA/GPC Craft Studio, the Student Design Center, student organizations, Mizzou Spirit, MUTV and the MSA departments of activities, student services and publicity and promotions. Added to that she directly supervises three support, five professional and more than 40 student staff members.

Colleagues, peers and students note that she is "never too busy for the students who need her. She takes time to really get to know the students as people, and her door and heart are always open to them."

Last fall, she and her students produced nearly 150 social events on campus that offered something for everyone. One colleague says, "While many of us leave work in the evening or spend weekends at home, Kathy can often be found setting up a show or working a late night, or all night, event."

Her commitment to helping students find their niche at MU goes beyond programming. One student, in noting Murray's efforts to help her adjust to MU, says: "Her diligence and patience exceeded that of any counselor, and her knowledge and wisdom defied the standards of any academic professor or TA. She made my books come to life and helped me to understand the true meaning of discovery and excellence."

A feeling of belonging helps students achieve their goals in and out of the classroom, Murray says. "If students feel connected to the institution, if they understand that there are

As an administrative assistant at the Law Library, Kathy Smith's job can seem complicated sometimes - keeping an eye on the library's budget, handling sensitive personnel issues, and overseeing the maintenance needs for the law school's Hulston Hall, to name a few.

But in reality, the job boils down to one overriding responsibility, says Smith, a 20-year MU employee. "I really believe that we're here for the students," she says. "Sometimes they think they're bugging you when they ask for help with something. But I always tell them, 'You're not bothering me; that's what I'm here for.' I really enjoy working with students."

Her law school colleagues say that it's not just students that Smith connects with. "Often she is the first contact between the library and other University departments. Campus personnel find her a pleasure to work with," says Martha Dragich Pearson, the Law Library director. "Kathy's ability to establish warm, helpful relationships with people extends beyond the immediate workplace. Even when dealing with problems she never loses her cool."

And when problems surface, Smith is ready to tackle them. For example, she once noticed some special orientation needs for new law library employees. So Smith volunteered to prepare a new employee handbook to orient new library workers to some of the special policies there.

Co-workers say that Smith knows every square inch of Hulston Hall, from the vents on the roof to the air handlers in the mechanical room. That's why Smith is the person they call when something goes amiss with the building's maintenance.

Because of her long experience with what she calls "our palace," she also knows just exactly which department or which campus expert to call to get things back on track. As the building coordinator, Smith makes weekly inspection trips through Hulston Hall to stay ahead of any problems. "I've come to love this building," she says. "It's my baby."

Smith stays just as busy off the job. She loves bluegrass music, and travels to festivals with her husband in search of more of that high-and-lonesome sound. He plays the bass fiddle with local groups,

and she even picks a bit on the mandolin. The couple built their own log home near Hartsburg, and when there's any time to spare Smith enjoys doing cross-stitching.

## Q&A

**Q** Given the tough budget times the University is facing, what benefits or rights do I have if I am laid off?

**A** You may be eligible for some or all of the following benefits depending on your benefit-eligible years with the University at the time of layoff. The following information about possible benefits comes from MU's Human Resource Services:

- Leave of absence for up to one year. If you worked for the University continuously in a benefit eligible position for five years or more, then you may receive up to one year of leave and for less than five years you may receive up to three months of layoff leave. Non-regular employees (part time and temporary) and probationary employees are excluded.

- Preferential hiring rights are available in the department from which you were laid off. Preferential hiring will end if you take a benefit-eligible position in any University department. You must apply for any open position in the department you left and will be interviewed with other department candidates.

- Transition Assistance Pay is available from 1.) a minimum of 4 weeks for employees with less than five years of continuous service 2.) up to one week for each year of benefit-eligible service if you have more than five years of benefit-eligible service.

- Retention of medical benefits during the layoff leave. While on a layoff leave you are eligible to retain your benefits.

Costs are shared by both the employee and employer as they were prior to layoff.

- Seniority is retained for the period of the leave. Accrued vacation is paid in a lump sum in your last regular check. Sick leave is frozen during your layoff leave and is reinstated when you return to a benefit-eligible position. Personal days are retained during your layoff leave, but are lost if your anniversary date falls during the time of the leave. Four new personal days are granted, to be used when you return to a benefit-eligible position.

- You may work in a non-benefit eligible position while on a layoff leave of absence and retain your layoff rights. If you wish to apply for unemployment benefits, contact the Division of Employment Security in Jefferson City at 1-800-320-2519. Information regarding who is laid off is not public information and will not be released by supervisors or other University members. See HR policy 114.

**Q** What happens when my layoff leave ends and I have not found another benefit-eligible position?

**A** The following will happen: You will be terminated from your benefit-eligible position.

Preferential hiring rights cease to exist. Sick leave and personal days are forfeited. Seniority ends, and medical benefits may be extended through COBRA at your expense.

### Correction

An April 25 *Mizzou Weekly* article that reported on the MU Faculty Council's April 18 meeting incorrectly attributed a statement to council member Sara Gable,

assistant professor of human development and family studies. That statement actually was made by Peggy Placier, associate professor of educational leadership and policy analysis.

Council members were discussing a student proposal that would bring to campus an online service called Pick-a-Prof which posts student evaluations of faculty and grade averages and distributions for individual courses. Placier raised concerns that the service could prompt students to seek out professors who are easy graders.

### Mizzou renews agreement with Georgian universities

MU and two universities in Kutaisi, Columbia's sister city in the Republic of Georgia, have renewed a sister university agreement that originally was signed in 1997. A delegation from Kutaisi State Technical University and Kutaisi Akai Tsereteli State University joined MU Chancellor Richard Wallace for a May 7 signing ceremony in the Jesse Hall rotunda.

Over the past five years, the sister university relationship has fostered faculty and student exchanges and encouraged other programs of sharing with Georgia, which is celebrating 10 years of independence following the fall of the Soviet Union.

The Crosbys' gift will be used to advance several important components of the MBA program, including recruiting a high-ability student body, providing students with added opportunities for professional development outside the classroom, and supporting the instruction and development of faculty who are involved with the program. The proceeds of the gift also will be used to sustain

the high level of collaboration with alumni and companies that is a hallmark of the College and its MBA program.

"This very significant and remarkably generous gift will allow the college to accelerate the momentum of the initiative to expand and enhance the MBA program," Walker said of the Crosbys' investment in MU's future. "This donation, which consists of a \$1 million cash gift and a \$9 million charitable trust

gift, will assure that today's students, as well as future generations of students, receive an absolutely top-caliber MBA degree from MU. We are very grateful that Gordon and Chessie Crosby share our vision regarding the promising future of our MBA program."

Walker says the college prides itself on its emphasis on collaborative education involving alumni and business firms, and its commitment to infusing

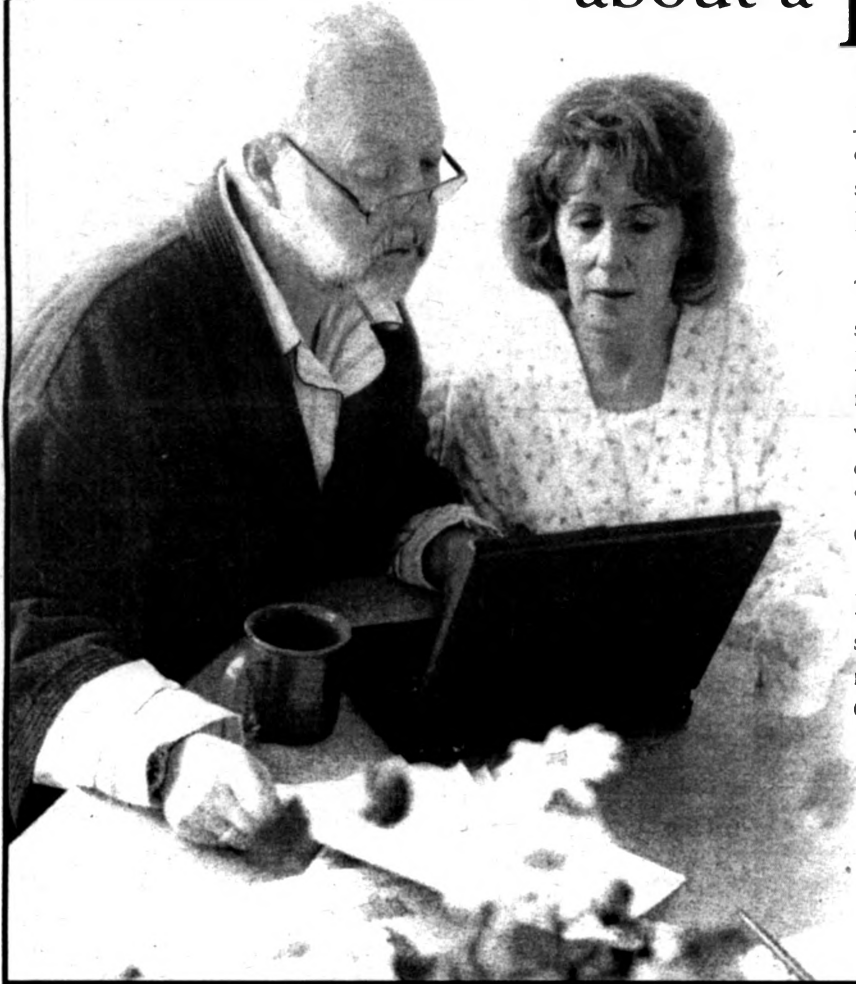
information technology throughout its curricula. Cornell Hall will provide the college with the capability to advance those features to new levels, Walker adds.

For example, all classrooms in Cornell Hall have ceiling projectors, a dedicated computer, a DVD/VCR player, network connections and document cameras. Video over the Internet, along with permanently installed cameras, allows for two-way

video in one classroom, while portable cameras make two-way video available in all other classrooms. Data ports have been installed in student lounge areas throughout the building.

With a total cost of nearly \$30 million, the state of Missouri proved \$17.1 million, and MU added \$750,000 for adjacent infrastructure work. The remaining \$12 million is being raised from private donors.

And you may communicate with your primary-care provider who practices at University Physicians—Green Meadows family medicine clinic or University Physicians—Fairview internal medicine clinic. For example, you may request:

- Answers to your nonurgent health-care questions
- Prescription refills or renewals
- HMO referrals

So the next time you want to make an appointment for a physical or renew a prescription, don't pick up the phone. Just move your mouse anytime, anywhere.
