A strategy for the 21st century

New strategic plan ensures the UM System is among the 'best and most progressive.'

The Board of Curators last week approved a new strategic plan for the UM System that will provide a foundation and a framework for the future of the University. Also at the Sept. 2 meeting in Portageville, curators approved a resource plan that will provide the financial foundation to implement this blueprint for the future.

"The strategic plan, which is fully consistent with the four-year mission enhancement plan approved in 1997, is designed to ensure that the University of Missouri is competitive with the best and most progressive public university systems," said UM President Manuel Pacheco.

"In its systemwide application, this plan breaks new ground among state university systems. The plan reflects the unique missions of the four campuses, Outreach and Extension, and the University System as a whole and enables

us to focus our priorities."

At the heart of the plan, Pacheco said, are four critical success factors: student learning and achievement; program access and quality; research and scholarship; and responsiveness to state, national and international needs.

The new strategic plan has been designed as a rolling plan, Pacheco said. "That means that it will be reviewed frequently and modified as needed. The assumptions on which it rests will be re-examined continually in the light of the most current information about the internal and external environments and, whenever necessary, realigned accordingly."

To help implement the new strategic plan, curators also approved a resource plan which consists of a set of revenue and spending assumptions that guide the University's resource planning.

Mizzou will more than meet those budget targets, in part by planning a one-

time reduction of \$8.5 million for the fiscal year that begins next July. That reduction would be followed by much smaller reductions of \$1.4 million in each of the next four years.

In speaking to campus groups over the past several weeks, Chancellor Richard Wallace detailed how the UM System planning assumptions impact Mizzou's budgeting plans over the next five years. "If you'll think back across these assumptions," Wallace said, "we're not really asked to do anything that we haven't decided to do for ourselves anyway."

The chancellor stressed that campus budget plans include a great deal of flexibility. If, for instance, student enrollments, state appropriations or indirect cost recovery are higher than estimated, the budget reductions might not need to be as high as planned.

Campus units now are developing plans to meet those budget adjustment targets. "We will do our best to manage these adjustments by using turnover and attrition," Wallace said.

UM System Resource Planning Assumptions

■ The annual growth in discretionary funds from state appropriations will not exceed 2 percent for fiscal years 2001 and 2002, and 3.5 percent for fiscal years 2003, 2004 and 2005.

Although, the University has seen continuing annual increases in state appropriations, a portion of those increases have been earmarked for specific programs and is not available for discretionary spending. For instance, in the current fiscal year which began July 1, the increase in state funding for MU was 5.5 percent. However, 3.5 percent of those monies were set aside for mission enhancement, leaving an overall increase of 2 percent in discretionary funding.

Following the 2002 fiscal year, when the four-year mission enhancement funding cycle for the University ends, the planning assumptions call for state discretionary funding to increase by 3.5 percent annually.

■ Student educational fees will increase at the rate of inflation in the Higher Education Price Index or approximately 3 percent a year.

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Going global

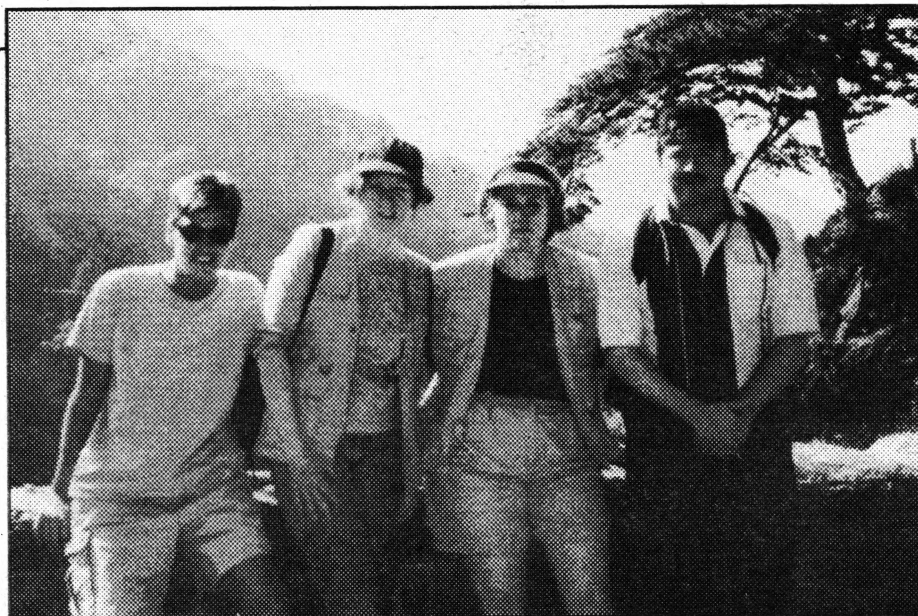
Summer program helps faculty 'internationalize' Mizzou's curriculum.

Eighteen Mizzou faculty members spent two weeks in China and Brazil this summer. The visit was not a leisurely summer break vacation, but a learning experience filled with visits to historical places, cultural icons, media outlets and academic institutions meant to enrich the lives of the professors and eventually the lives of their students.

The faculty are taking part in MU's Global Scholars program, which was established two years ago to accelerate the internationalization of the undergraduate curriculum across campus.

The program's goal is that Mizzou undergraduates, who are mostly Missouri natives, will benefit from crosscultural components taught in their classes, developed and taught by faculty who have firsthand knowledge from studying abroad.

"The summer seminars are designed to give faculty multiple opportunities to jump-start professional relationships, research collaborations and program linkages," said John Heyl, director of the International Center. "Though they go to



the same field trips and lectures, each faculty member sees things through the lens of their discipline and returns to their classes with unique ideas."

Animal science, nursing, allied health, engineering, environmental design, history and advertising were among the disciplines represented in the Global Scholars summer seminar to China.

Also this summer, Provost Brady Deaton led an MU delegation to China to sign a new agreement that calls for an exchange of faculty and staff between the School of Journalism and the China Daily, that country's largest English language newspaper.

"To actually spend time interacting with and exploring close up, how people live half-way around the world was a precious reward for me," said Paula Slusher, clinical instructor in nursing,

"Living the experience was so much more beneficial than any attempt I could have ever made to learn from second-hand information exchange."

Slusher and fellow scholar Mike Prewitt, assistant professor of health related professions, made some unexpected connections through a lecture they gave to medical and nursing students at Nankai University in Tianjin, China. Now, not only do they plan to internationalize their own courses at MU, they also may internationalize Chinese university courses, by helping them integrate MU's problem-based learning methods.

Prewitt said it is too soon to tell, but other collaborations also might be possible in the areas of child health, indoor air quality and rehabilitation.

In addition to the 18 scholars chosen

for the group summer seminars, 18 individual Global Scholars grantees have visited other countries throughout this year.

With the ultimate goal of creating a community of faculty dedicated to transforming MU's undergraduate curriculum for the global millennium, the Global Scholars Program has a few workshops and conferences in the works.

On October 6-7, MU will host a statewide conference called "Internationalizing Faculty & Curriculum: 21st Century Issues for Teaching, Technology & Tenure." The conference will be one of many opportunities for Global Scholars participants to share their experiences and inspire others to think globally as well.

GRADUATE PAYOFF

Mizzou's efforts to expand the availability of graduate education continue to pay off. Since 1989, the success of MU's McNair Scholars Program has made it a model for other universities. The program offers paid internships to students who are the first members of their families to attend college, or are members of groups underrepresented in graduate education.

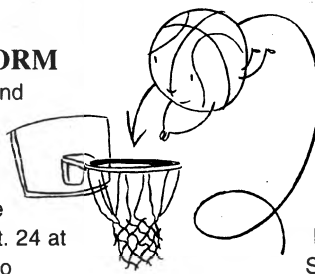
That success was rewarded recently with an additional \$1.08 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education to continue the program for the next four years. "The purpose is to

prepare students for graduate study," said Vicki Curby, program director. At MU, the program works with up to 100 students every year and has 21 paid internships this year. The internships are geared toward helping students gain research experience.

"We take students from any discipline. They get to work with a faculty mentor. The program involves at least 250 hours worth of research," Curby says. "Generally, around 75 percent of students are admitted into a graduate program." Thanks to the McNair program, 24 MU students already have completed their doctoral education.

Going critical

Hospital welcomes public to new critical care tower.

Intensive care for Missourians has taken a significant step forward with the dedication of the University Hospital's new Critical Care Tower. The addition will be open to the public for the dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremony from 3 - 4:30 p.m. today, Sept. 9 on the fifth floor of the tower.

The 193,870-square-foot addition has seven floors and provides the latest in medical technology for critically ill or injured adults and newborns. The \$51 million facility includes 54 private rooms for adults, each capable of handling intensive or intermediate level care for patients.

"Caring for a critically injured or ill patient can be one of the more challenging - and rewarding - parts of practicing medicine. For more than 40 years, University Hospital and Clinics has cared

for this patient population, providing the highest quality care to those who needed our service," said Daniel Winship, vice chancellor of health affairs.

"This new facility offers much-needed space for patient care and teaching, and it also gives these patients and their families more privacy during a time that can be very stressful to them."

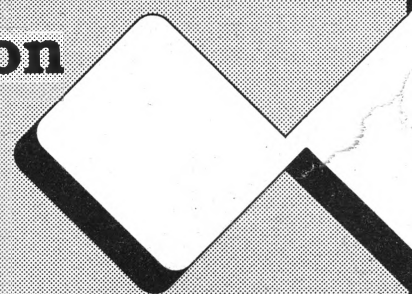
Each room is almost three times the size of the current space per patient. "This is an important feature for critically ill patients because their condition can change in an instant," said Kirt Nichols, University Hospital chief of staff.

The Newborn Intensive Care Unit on the seventh floor is organized into levels of care to provide better efficiency for patients.

Last year the University Hospital treated approximately 2,500 adults in its intensive care units from nearly every county in Missouri. The newborn intensive care unit cared for almost 300 newborns. From year to year, these numbers represent 25 percent of the hospital's total patient population.

tuition policy that the Board of Curators enacted in December 1996.

■ **Student enrollments are anticipated to grow 4 percent for the UM System over the next five years.**

"That is less than our own planning, which said that at MU we want to achieve a target enrollment growth five years out of something like 1 percent a year compounded, for a total increase over the whole time period of 6.6 percent," Wallace said.

"It's ambitious and it's of concern to me," he said. "The environment out there is getting very competitive. We're doing well, but it's going to take a lot of effort down at the divisional level as well as the campus level."

■ **Salary increases will average 4 percent per year.**

Faced with a \$400 across-the-board salary increase for employees this year, the University is determined to do better in future years, Wallace said. To do that, a 4 percent annual pool for salary increases has been built into the new budget model.

Wallace cautioned that the 4 percent figure is an average, "It's not intended to be across-the-board; it will be market and merit raises, so that will give us some flexibility." During his 32 years at MU, the chancellor noted, "we never really set an institutional objective of that nature, but what we've found a way through

flexibility at the divisional and departmental levels to exceed that. So if we set our budgeting target at 4 percent, I bet you we actually come in closer to 5 percent. Will we? Time will tell."

■ **Total benefit costs will increase by 8 percent annually.**

"What is it? It's health care," Wallace said. "We're just between the rock and the hard place on this. It's not just us, it's happening across the nation. We don't have any solution, neither does anyone else. I can only hope that something happens and this gets better. It can not go on indefinitely; there has to be some solution in time."

■ **The cost for equipment and other expenses (E&E) will increase at an annual rate of 3 percent per year.**

"That doesn't mean the plan presumes that every E&E budget will get 3 percent. That's an average," the chancellor said. "That 3 percent also would cover our expense to open new buildings, and we've got some big ones coming on line down the way. It will also have to cover increases in computing costs."

■ **Reserve accumulation to equal 5 percent of general operating revenue by year five of the plan.**

Wallace stressed that the UM System plan does not call for MU to build that 5 percent reserve in a single year. "That's impossible; no one is thinking about that. But if we set this as a target, we'll move

toward it and hopefully achieve it by the end of the fifth year," the chancellor said.

MU must build its reserve to meet any future budget challenges, he said. "We cannot continue to operate on such a small margin in the general operating budget." By the 2005 fiscal year, a 5 percent reserve would translate into \$20.2 million of MU's general operating budget.

■ **Reduce the discount rate for financial aid.**

The discount rate is the difference between the "sticker price" of an MU education and the average of what students actually pay after financial aid is figured in. "This is of tremendous importance and concern for us. It is, in a sense, the most difficult problem embedded in the budgeting process," Wallace said.

Budget planners now are working to identify financial aid reductions that would have the least impact on students. Wallace has emphasized that there will be no future reductions in student financial aid for minorities.

The current discount rate at Mizzou is 32 percent; the campus will try to reduce that to 25 percent at the end of five years, the chancellor said. "We had, through the early '90s, increased expenditures on undergraduate financial aid programs at a very rapid pace, and they just weren't built into the budget in a way that didn't leave us a problem," he said

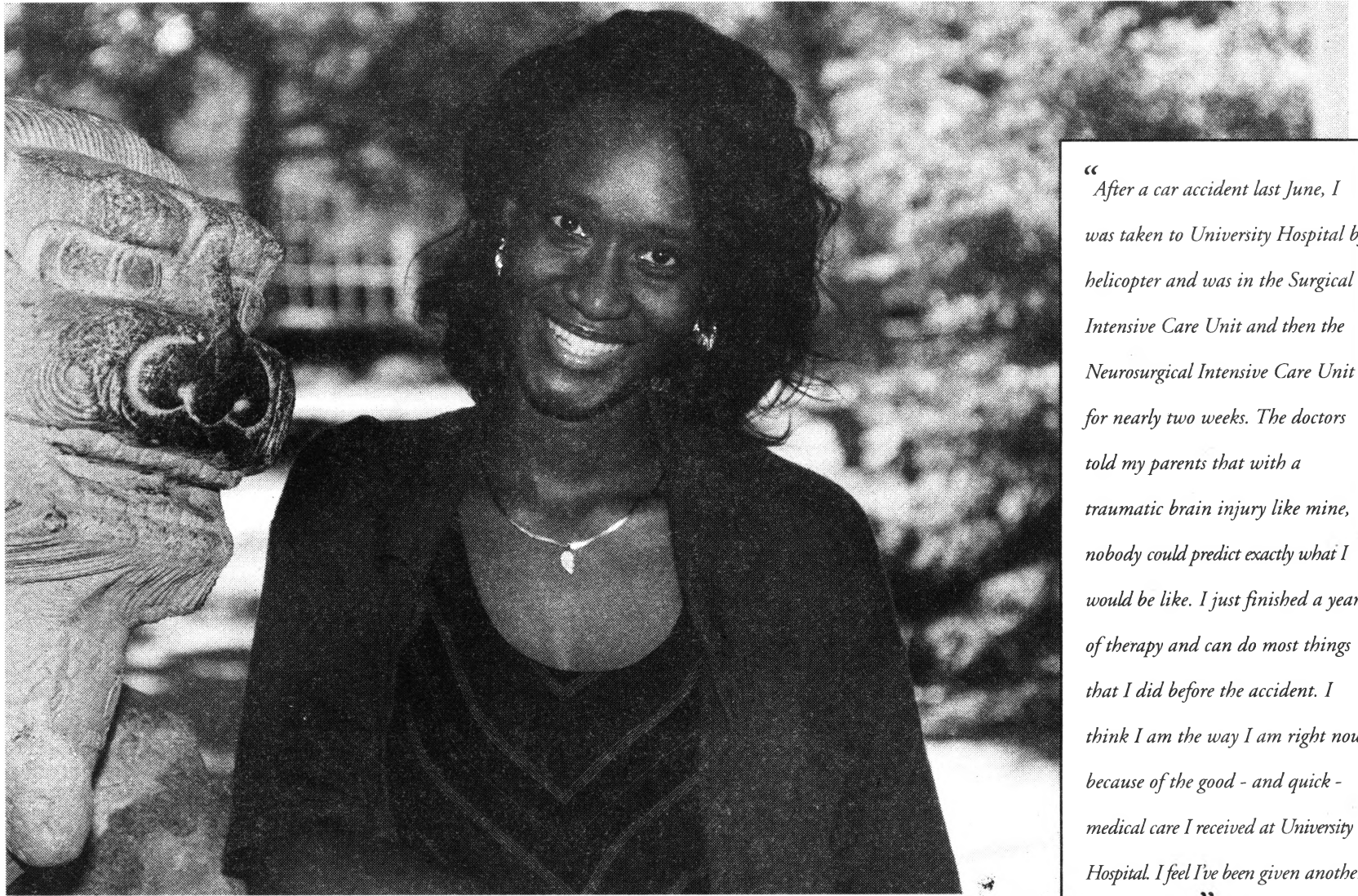

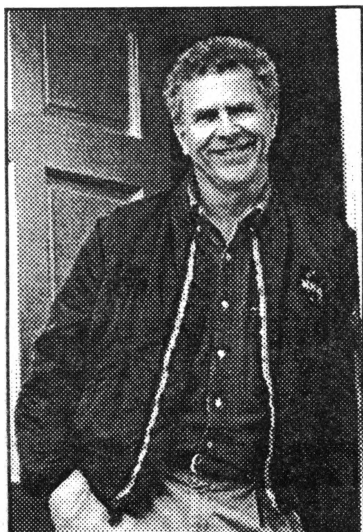

Extension leader named

John Gardner of Carrington, N. Dak., has been named associate dean for extension at the College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources. Gardner, who will start Nov. 1, also will be agricultural program director for MU extension on the Columbia campus. Gardner will fill the position opened by the retirement of Norlin Hein. "He brings to our college, the University and the state the expertise to support agriculture now and into the future," says Tom Payne dean of the college. "He will be an outstanding member of the administrative team of our college and is an excellent addition to the University's extension activities."

Tom Henderson, interim vice provost for MU Extension, said. "I am excited about his mix of academic preparation, both in extension and applied research. He brings real-world knowledge to the role."

From Carrington, Gardner said. "I have spent 20 years in the rural Great Plains researching, doing extension education, farming and ranching. Of late, I've been learning first hand the value-chain from farm gate to consumer — and of the

corporate world that manages that chain." The position is the first to be filled in a search for three members of a "dean team" to work with Payne in leading the college. The search is under way for associate deans for teaching and for research.

Gardner is president and general manager of AgGrow Oils, a value-added new-generation cooperative. AgGrow Oils is a grower-owned agricultural processing business. It built a new oil seed crushing plant, capitalized by 540 North Dakotans who invested more than \$5 million in 1997.

Prior to helping start the co-op in 1996, Gardner was director of a North Dakota State University research and extension center in Carrington. He also held the position of adjunct professor of plant sciences at North Dakota State.

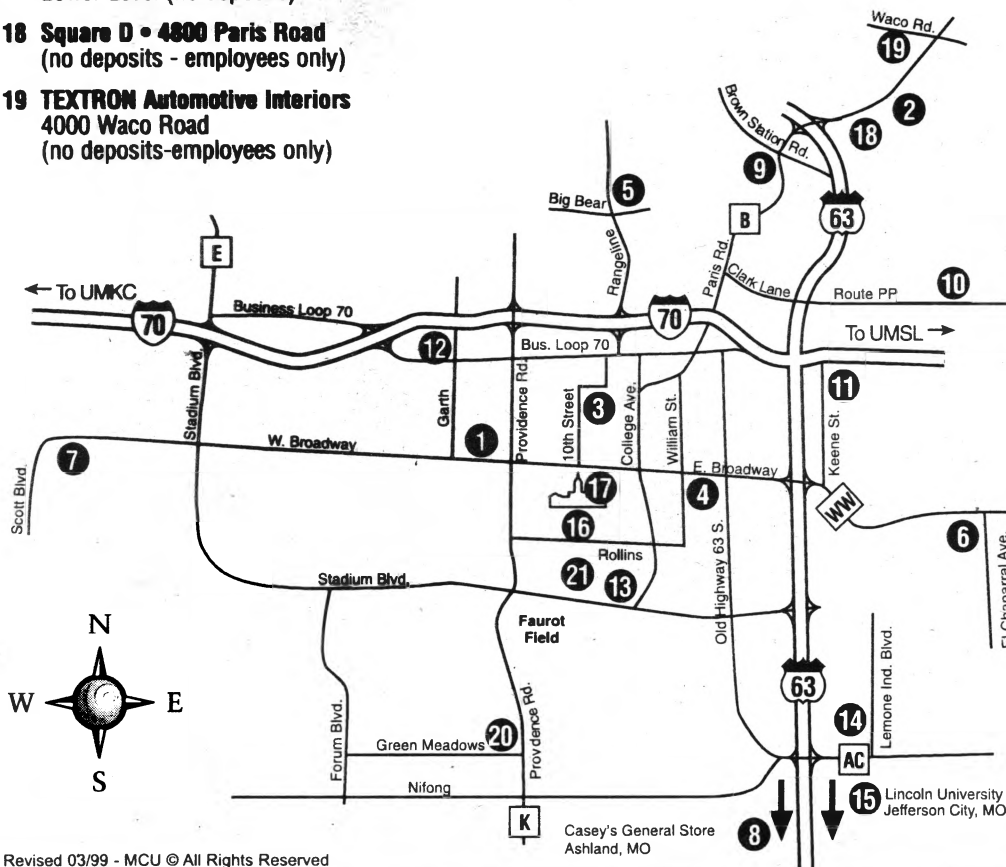
Gardner received his doctorate in agronomy from the University of Nebraska in 1988. Gardner, 41, was born and raised in Shawnee Mission, Kan. Both sides of his family trace roots to Missouri. His father's family came from Cole Camp, Mo., and his mother's family from Independence, Mo., and Kansas City.
